CLEVER CAPTURE OF TOUGHS.

On Tuesday night F. E. Moore and E. C. Wainwright, two Salt Lake gentlemen, came to Ogden and left their grips in the Union depot waiting room. When they went up town on some business, on returning about a half hour later they were surprised to find that their three valises had disappeared. They contained catalogues, wearing apparel, a fine mandolin and other articles all of the value of about \$100. The police department was notified of the affair and a description of some men who were suspected was given. Detective Pender and Patrolman Burton had an idea where the men were, so the officers started out, and in less than an hour four hard-looking cases were arrested in a room in the "Little Broom" lodging house, three of them were in bed, and the other lay under one of the bunks. They were placed under arrest and taken to the city jail where they have their names as George Brown, P. F. Roach, James Banks and R. H. Williams. The officers returned to the room and found part of the stolen goods in the beds, behind pictures and hid in other parts of the room, but only one grip was found, so some old shavers in the rear of the lodging house were next searched, and in an old out house which was securely nailed up, the other two grips were recovered.
