

BIG DOINGS AT STATE FAIR TRACK

Horses Are Off for First Program of the Six Days Meet.

GOOD SPORT IS PROMISED.

Over 200 Racers With Drivers and Jockeys, Are at Agricultural Park After Big Money.

They're off! Down at Agricultural Park this afternoon there is a big crowd of horse racing watching the events of the first day's fast racing of the big six-day meet.

There will be something doing every afternoon until and including Saturday.

This is the most important meet of the year and Salt Lake has ever had. It is of great interest to horsemen all over the west. Many of the fastest pacers, trotters and runners are here for the meet. These horses are to be handled by expert drivers and jockeys.

More than 200 speedsters are quartered at the grounds ready to go after the big purses now up by about \$10,000. Jones' leading visiting horsemen freely predict that those who visit the track from day to day will see the best horse races of their lives.

More than 200 followers of the turf are now in the city from outside points and will remain here for the week. There are over 200 entries in the various features of the big meet will be the leading bill. It is claimed that the animal is not vicious and the horse is not afraid of men.

The owners offer \$10 to any man who can stay on the horse's back two minutes, and bookmakers will back the animal giving good odds, up to \$100. The best drivers and jockeys from Colorado, Wyoming and Utah are going to handle the animal.

The events beginning at 2:15 this afternoon consist of two heats, two harness racing and three running.

While he excused himself from a general discussion of Equitable affairs, Mr. Morton, admitted, in response to a direct inquiry by a representative of the Associated Press, that his position to the management of the division of \$25,000 a year now paid to Mrs. Henry Hyde, widow of the founder of the Equitable society, was under consideration. The pension, however, has not been discontinued yet, it was made clear by Chairman Morton that Mrs. Hyde's pension is to be considered with the other pensions now paid to the society, that is, her pension will not be discontinued, if at all, as an exception. The whole matter of pensions by the Equitable will be considered purely as a business proposition. Chairman Morton will present the subject to the directors of the society at a meeting to be held next Wednesday, but there is no assurance that the matter will be definitely settled at that time. The payment of the current vouchers for Mrs. Hyde's pension, as well as for the pensions of others, will remain in abeyance until a final decision of the general question of pensions shall have been made.
