

BIG DOINGS AT STATE FAIR TRACK

Horses Are Off for First Program of the Six Days Meet.

GOOD SPORT IS PROMISED.

Over 200 Racers With Drivers and Jockeys, Are at Agricultural Park After Big Money.

They're off! Down at Agricultural Park this afternoon there is a big crowd of horse race fans watching the events of the first day's racing of the six-day meet.

There will be something doing every afternoon until including Saturday. This is the most important meet of the year at Agricultural Park. It is an affair of interest to horsemen all over the state. Many of the fastest pacers, great west horses are here for the money. These horses are to be handled by competent drivers and jockeys.

All the grounds ready to go after the big prize money. The first race of the day will be a half-mile race. The horses are to be handled by competent drivers and jockeys.

Probably more than 500 followers of the turf are now in the city from outside. There are over 200 bookmakers, headed by J. H. Wilson, who are doing a big business. The feature of the big meet will be the half-mile race. It is claimed that the horses are not vicious and that he knows nothing but bucking. The owners offer \$1000 to any man who can stay on the horse for two minutes and bookmakers will back the animal, giving good odds. Up to 1000 cowboys and broncho busters from Idaho, Wyoming and Utah are going to take the animal.

INSURANCE PENSIONS.

Equitable Society Will Probably Discontinue Paying Them.

Oyster Bay, July 23.—Chairman Paul Morton of the Equitable Assurance society was a guest today of President and Mrs. Roosevelt at Sagamore Hill.

Mr. Morton arrived at the president's home from New York last evening. He returned to New York this afternoon. As a former cabinet officer and a close personal friend of the president, he visited him to obtain a brief rest from his labors in connection with the re-adjustment of Equitable affairs.

Assurance is given that his visit was not of serious public significance. While he excused himself from a general discussion of Equitable affairs, Mr. Morton, admitted, in response to a direct inquiry by a representative of the Associated Press, that a proposition to discontinue the pension of \$25,000 a year now paid to Mrs. Henry B. Hyde, widow of the founder of the Equitable society, was under consideration.

The pension, however, has not been discontinued yet. It was made clear by Chairman Morton that Mrs. Hyde's pension is to be considered with other pensions now paid by the society, that is, her pension will not be discontinued, if at all, as an exception.

The pension will be considered purely as a business proposition. Chairman Morton will present the subject to the directors of the society, and a decision will be held next Wednesday, but there is no assurance that the matter will be definitely settled at that time. The payment of the pension vouchers for Mrs. Hyde's pension, as well as for the pensions of others, will remain in abeyance until a final decision of the general question of pensions shall have been made.
