Fillmore, Millard Co., Aug. 18 .-- Yesterday an inquest was held over the oody of the illegitimate child of Susie Gulis, which died at its birth about three weeks ago and was quietly buried in the lot.

As there was no physician present some of the people were inclined to believe that the death of the child was caused by unlawful means; conse-quently, to fully discharge their duties public officers and satisfy the minds those who entertained such ideas, an investigation was instituted.
