Beautiful Crochet Work.—Today we were shown one of the finest and most intricate pieces of crochet work, in the shape of a tidy, we have ever seen. The pattern is neat and the main feature of it consists of a number of raised roses, with the flower leaves as near to the form of nature as could be in that kind of work. It was done by the hand of Sister Allington, of the 6th Ward.

Very Thirsty.—We are requested, by a resident of the locality, to state that the dwellers on Arsenal Hill bench, otherwise known as the 17th and 19th Wards bench, have been without a supply of water, other than came from the clouds in feathery flakes or is strewn around in congealed slabs. Sunday School.—Yesterday, Sunday, was a happy day in the record of the Tenth Ward Sunday school, announcement having been made that prizes to the teachers and scholars of said school would be distributed. The large new meeting-house was packed with children and their parents. About 325 prizes were distributed, ranging downwards from \$3 each. Some more expensive and valuable prizes were given by the members of the higher classes to their teachers from funds raised privately among themselves. Among the latter class of testimonials was a Webster's unabridged dictionary to Brother John Kirkman, also a neatly bound "Book of Mormon" to Brother James H. Harrison.

Interesting About Silk.—To-day there were exhibited to us thirty-six skeins of very beautifully reeled silk, weighing, in the aggregate, four and a half ounces, produced at President Young's cocoonery, by Mrs. Dunyon, and reeled by the same lady; also from the same source, a sample of sewing silk, manufactured by that intelligent lady, who appears to have a good understanding of many of the details of the silk business. She has not only demonstrated that the silk raw material can be raised here, but also, to some extent, be manufactured. Mrs. Dunyon is about preparing some silk for Brother Hannam, of Provo, who purposes weaving from it a piece of satin, to be placed in the Centennial Exhibition.

Mr. D. is desirous of forming a class of young women, with a view to instructing them in the details of silk raising, reeling, &c.

The progress of silk culture in Utah may be apparently slow, yet it is steadily and surely gaining ground on the road which leads to its becoming some time one of the staple and chief products of the Territory.

Accidentally Killed.—About five o'clock on Saturday evening Brother William Hailstone, butcher, an old and well known citizen of Salt Lake, having arrived here in 1854, was crossing East Temple Street from the direction of the Eagle Emporium to the Exchange Buildings corner, when he was knocked down and run over by a sleigh driven by Mr. Roundy. He was taken to Godbe and Co's drug store and examined by a physician when it was ascertained that he had received severe injuries. He was conveyed to the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. William Peterson, butcher, in the 15th Ward, where he lingered till five o'clock this morning, when he expired. An inquest was to be held by Coroner Taylor and a jury to-day.

We understand that the intervention of a street car between Mr. Roundy and Mr. Hailstone prevented the former from seeing the latter until the moment he was struck and knocked down, yet the presence of the obstacle that intercepted the view of the driver should have suggested the exercise of caution, of which there is too great an absence with sleigh drivers on our streets generally. The occurrence of this lamentable accident, by which a peaceable and respectable citizen has lost his life, is powerfully suggestive of the necessity of stringent prohibitory measures against fast and careless driving.
