Ogden's Suicide.

L. D. Youngblood, formerly a waiter at the Union Depot Hotel, committed suicide on Wednesday. He went into Gebow's barber shop at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, had good bye to all the boys and said he was going to kill himself. Thinking he was only intoxicated and talking at random, they took no notice of his remark and allowed him to take out a phial, which he told them contained ten grains of morphine, and swallowed the contents. No apprehension was felt and Youngblood staggered out of the shop and went down to Beardsley's hotel where he took a seat and remained in a stupor until the proprietor and a waiter, thinking the man was drunk, took hold of him and assisted him to the door. He sank down upon the platform, the depot policeman took him in charge and conveyed him to the Globe Hotel. Here he began to show alarming symptoms of poisoning, and immediately a physician was summoned. All efforts were vain to resuscitate him, however, and he died about 11 o'clock Wednesday night. A coroner's inquest rendered a verdict in accordance with the above facts, which we glean from the Dispatch. The verdict gives the name L. A. Youngblood. Domestic trouble is the alleged cause of his intemperance and death. His wife committed suicide last April in Denver, leaving a little girl to her husband's care.

A Family Separation.

The other evening a prominent citizen and his wife drove to the railroad depot in a buggy, the gentleman occupying the front seat and his lady the rear of the vehicle. The object was to allow the horse, which was young, spirited, and somewhat refractory, to witness the arrival of the train, and become used to the sound of the whistle, as it was designed to use the animal as a family carriage horse.

Along came the cars with the snorting, screaming monster ahead, and away went the horse kicking, rearing and plunging. The driver, finding that the animal was really in earnest, as the half shattered vehicle now bore testimony, wheeled around and started for home, but had not gone far before the buggy parted in two, leaving the lady in the road with half of it, while the better half moved away with the rest. No one was hurt, however, and the divorced twain were in due time again made one.

Fair Items.

The Fair is still thronged with visitors. Among the many creditable displays which we have so far omitted to mention are the following: E. F. Bird's carved clock, the principal ornament of which is a large bunch of flowers cut out of a solid piece of wood. It is a beautiful piece of workmanship. Solomon Brothers' fine display of home-made boots and shoes. A colossal lump of coal from Browning and Company's Mine, Lost Creek. This lump weighs 1,500 lbs., is semi-anthracite in character, very hard and firm, although having been exposed to the sun for three weeks. The Provo Valley marble, a fine exhibition of which is on exhibition, and constitutes one of the main cynosures of public interest. It is the product of the Wasatch Marble and Mining Company, and must be seen to be appreciated. Watson Brothers have taken the premium for floral carving on stone and marble. A white marble head-stone with a single lily carved upon it, is one of the most delicate and handsome pieces of work we have seen in the Fair. J. H. Brown, and Son, stone and marble workers, of Logan, has a handsome monument on exhibition, 15 feet in height. It is a noble piece of work and reflects much credit on the artisan who fashioned it. It has been sold for \$200. R. Matthews & Co's Jamaica Ginger is also worthy of mention. It took the first prize.
