

WAVE OF CRIME ROLLS OVER CITY

Yegg Men, Holdups, Safecrackers and Thieves Busy Plying Their Trade.

FOUR "JOBS" THURSDAY NIGHT

The Gang Apparently Employs Women as "Lookout," Judging by High Heelprints.

The wave of crime that has rolled over Salt Lake City with the coming of cold weather dogged the town with an attempted safe cracking job, a hold-up, and two burglaries, Thursday night.

It appears that the "yeggs" are working with a woman as "lookout," as the deep prints of high-heeled French slippers were discovered this morning in the molten earth of the street in front of the Anheuser-Busch Brewing company's office and store house at 533 west Fourth West street, where a gang tried to break open the safe but failed.

The attempted safe cracking job was not discovered until this morning, when George Olson, Jr., son of one of the Anheuser-Busch agents, opened the office. It appears that the yeggs had broken open a window on the side of the building, jumping into the office. They took twice but two large railroad coupling pins. The combination knob of the safe was smashed to pieces with a sledge hammer, and the yeggs then tried to punch the lock in order to make the tumblers fall back. Just outside of the window were the prints of "Elf-toe" French heels, bearing the clear impression of brass plates. The marks of a horse and light buggy that were drawn up close also appeared.

HEELPRINTS TRACED.

The prints of the French heels were traced from the road up to the window, and careful measurement showed that the person wearing them took extraordinarily long steps. This would indicate that the "lookout" if it was a woman had watched in the road, and seeing somebody approaching had run up to the window and warned the yeggs, who immediately stopped their work and without taking the precaution of grabbing the coupling pins, made off in the horse buggy as fast as possible.

Another theory, which involves an odd situation, is that one of the yeggs, probably a small man with little feet, donned the woman's slippers as a "mask" as it is hard to conceive of a woman taking such long steps as the measurement of the footprints shows were taken by the "lookout."

The police are at sea, and the outcome of a woman confederate, if it is a woman, complicates matters considerably.

The Anheuser-Busch office would have proved of small benefit to the yeggs any rate, because little money is left in the safe, as the cash is seized every day, and what remains is carried home by one of the agents or clerks.

BORHRS SURPRISED.

The fact that the yeggs knocked the combination knob off and started to punch the lock to make the tumblers fall back, but quit suddenly, indicates that they must have been surprised, and that the person who wore the "Elf-toe" heeled shoes ran up to the window and warned them.

The agents, Lytle and Olson, report that nothing was stolen.

HAULING AWAY GROCERIES.

The police are also working on another hold-up committed Thursday night, but all of the sun marks of the jobs that have been done, excepted by three young thugs. While Nick Drury, the bartender, was in the ice bin, three young men, wearing handkerchiefs over their faces, walked into the Warm Springs saloon on north Second West street, opposite St. Mark's hospital, about after 12 o'clock, and held up A. B. Margotta, the proprietor, and eight men. The card room, securing in all about \$10. No trace has been found of the hold-ups.
