IS MADE A CAPITAL FELONY

Maintaining or Promulgating Anarchistic Doctrines to be Guilty of a High Misdemeanor.

New York, Oct. 5 .- The Hudson County, New Jersey, Bar association at a meeting called to hear the report of its committee appointed to recomend legislative acts for the repression of anarchy, ordered the report referred to a special committee. The first section of the proposed act specifies that "anarchy shall be made capital felony both as to the principals and accessories, as well before as after the fact. The term an-archy, for the purposes of this section shall be taken to include every act done, or word uttered with intent to cause, or to incite others to cause the assassi-nation of a President of the United States, or any person in the line of succession; the governor of a state or any person in the gubernatorial or the chief of any foreign state or any per-son in the line of succession thereof."

The second section provides that eve-ry person who without intent to cause ry person who winout might to cause or to incite others to cause the assassi-mation of the persons referred to in the first section, shall say or do any-thing with a view of maintaining or promulgating anarchistic doctrines shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor,
