Another Good Man Gone.—Bro. Ebenezer Brown departed this life at Draper, Salt Lake County, at a few minutes before 12 on the night of Jan. 25th.

He shared with the Saints in their persecutions, and when driven from the borders of civilization, the call being made for 500 men to fight the battles of Mexico, Father Brown was one of those who proved his fidelity to his country by volunteering in its service.

After his return he settled at Draper, in 1849, being the first settler at that place; in 1851 he was called, with others, to form a settlement where Parowan is now located, and in 1858, he was appointed a mission to Canon Valley, both of which he performed satisfactorily.

After the release of those called to Canon Valley, he returned to Draper, where he lived until his demise.

He was one of those who through the vicissitudes of an eventful life, never faltered in his faith in the principles of the gospel. He was alive to the interests of the work of God, and always ready to do whatever was necessary on his part to sustain it.

He leaves a large family and a very wide circle of friends who cherish his memory.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. COUNCIL. January 31st. Counselor Harrington, chairman of the committee on judiciary, presented the following report.

The committee on judiciary, to whom was referred H. F. No. 2, "A bill for an act amending sections 1151 and 1154 of the compiled laws," have had the same under consideration, and respectfully recommend that the amendment made by the Council be reconsidered, and that the bill be passed as it came from the House.

On motion of Counselor Thatcher, the report was accepted, the amendment reconsidered and read for the third time, and the bill was then read and passed.

The bill was then read and passed on its second reading, and on motion of Counselor (Snow) was read the third time by its title, the title read and the bill so passed and returned to the House.

Counselor Thatcher, chairman of the committee on mineral resources, presented the following: The committee on mineral resources, to whom was referred C. F. No. 3, "A bill for an act providing for the health and safety of persons employed in coal mines," but have to report the same with amendments, and recommend its passage as amended.

On motion of Counselor Burton the report was accepted. This bill, as amended, was taken up on its second reading in the Senate, amended, and the bill passed its second reading as amended.

A communication was received from the House, announcing that that body had receded from the House amendment to C. F. 4 not concurred in by the Council, and returning the bill for enrollment.

"A bill to secure justice to persons called to serve on juries," read and referred to the committee on judiciary, with instructions to print 75 copies, with instructions to print 75 copies.

Mr. Rockwood, chairman of committee on claims and appropriations, reported a recommendation that \$175 be placed upon the present appropriation bill for the purpose of printing bond sheets; adopted. Also that the claim of B. A. Spears, for services as bailiff of the 2d Judicial District Court, be not paid; adopted. Also that the bill of John M. Cumber for \$107 be not paid; adopted. Also that the petition of Wm. D. Pack, asking for relief, in the sum of \$170, be not paid; adopted.

The above bills allowed to be withdrawn from the table. Mr. Young presented a bill H. F. No. 18 for "An Act to Approve the Compiled Laws of Utah," read and referred to the committee on judiciary.

On motion of Mr. Lyman, the Sergeant-at-Arms was instructed to purchase a copy of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary; also the Revised Statutes of the United States on General Law," for the use of the House.

Mr. Birch presented a bill H. F. No. 14 for "An Act to amend an act for regulating proceedings in civil cases." Read and adopted. On motion of Mr. Milner, referred to the committee on judiciary.

H. F. No. 7, Revenue Bill, taken up at Sec. 10 on its second reading.
