## To Open Land to Settlement.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 14.-The United States through the federal land office at Los Angeles will open to settlers within the next few days about 1,000,000 acres of land in California. This land is situated between Needles and Mojave, and borders the Colorado river, Much of it is valuable agriculturally. The prospective throwing open of this vast tract to settlement is the result of a recent decision of the United States supreme court with respect to the famous grant made to the Atlantic and Pacific railroad by act of July.

In the territory which embraces this great tract the Southern Pacific has selection privilege. Authority for the receiving of entry applications for the 1,000,000 acres in question has been re-ceived from Washington by the officials of the United States land office at Los Angeles,

THE POSTAL'S PLANS.

Telegraph Company Will Enter Montana From Utah Points,

(Special to the "News.")

Butte, Mont., March 14 .- W. P. S. Hawk, superintendent of the Postal Telegraph company for Montana, said that according to the plans of the Postal company a line from Omaha to Denver, thence to Butte via Ogden and Salt Lake, would in all probability be commenced this year. A recent court decision gave the Postal a right of way along the tracks of the Short Line in fentana, by which route it will enter fontana from Utah points. In Montana he Postal is constructing a new line rom Helena and Butte to Missoula, om which point it is expected its free will be pushed north connecting ith the Winnipeg lines.
