

FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

Goitau is in favor of a crusade against the "Mormons."

Meeting of home missionaries to-night at the Council House.

Clear sky and nipping frost last night. Bright and shiny to-day.

Baron Seeman's last exhibition at the Theatre will be given to-night.

There is to be a social party in the Fifth Ward Assembly Rooms on Friday evening.

Yesterday the motion of the defense in the Poyon-Climax mining case was denied, and the trial proceeds.

Trains to haul freight from Green River to Fort Thornburgh, are in demand. A daily mail will shortly be put on between these two points.

Frederick Scribner, a very worthy young man of Brown's Park, Sweetwater County, Wyoming, died last week from the effects of poison taken from medicine.

Frank Treseder and Myer Seckel have been committed to jail in default of \$1,000 bail, to await the action of the grand jury in the Ogden robbery case.

There will be a meeting of the officers of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association of Salt Lake City in the Council House, this evening, at 7 o'clock.

Mrs. Mary Lambert, wife of Bro. George C. Lambert, had a fine, healthy, bouncing boy born yesterday afternoon. Another addition to the family of the latter.

Among the conspicuous peculiarities of 1883, is the bitter, unjust and senseless opposition directed against the Latter-day Saints, which is a disgrace to the nation, and to the world, as far as it extends.

On Monday night, Mayor Little's buggy collided with a wagon, on the highway of his horse shying. His horse was thrown out, but we are pleased to state, was uninjured. A front wheel of the vehicle was badly broken.

About a month ago a mysterious burglary occurred at Street Commissioner Pat Ford's boarding house, Omaha. Last Friday, through a negro woman, the robbers were "given away." The case was solved by Brant and Cusick, two Union Pacific employees. Both men were jailed.

The boy of Richard Walker, a bridge carpenter in the employ of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway, was found near the railway track at Albuquerque, on Thanksgiving morning. A frightful gash was found behind his ear, as though dealt by some blunt instrument. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the deceased was murdered by parties unknown. The supposition is that after the murder the body was laid near the track to create the impression that it was run over by the cars.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

For Permitting Gaming.—W.K. Conrad, saloon keeper, has been arrested on a charge of permitting gaming with dice on his premises. The case will come up Friday next.

The New Ordinances.—Ordinance and Patterson, and Hill and Trevel, liquor dealers, were before Justice Pyper yesterday, charged with selling after the hours specified by the new City ordinance. A fine of \$50 was imposed in each case.

A Fatal Fall.—The following special dispatch to the News from Silver City, Utah, was received this afternoon:

Thos. Connell fell 130 feet in the Euclid Hill mine, this district, at 1 p.m. to-day. He was killed, the body being terribly mangled. They have sent to Nephi for the coroner. Deceased leaves a wife and three children.

Home Again.—Apostle Franklin D. Richards returned from the south this morning and proceeded to Ogden this afternoon. He left President Taylor and party about noon yesterday, at Gunnison, where meeting was to be held by the main body of the company, while another meeting was to be held at Mayfield by President Woodruff. After that the party intended to proceed to Mant, where they are attending Stake Conference to-day.

Discharged.—Auer & Murphy and Russell & Burns, charged with selling whisky to an Indian, were discharged yesterday, there being no evidence against them. There were several witnesses who were with the Indian when he got the "firewater," and indulged with him in the bibulous business of muddling what little brains they possess, with potations of the vile stuff. Further than that, "they didn't know nothin'" so far as the place where they got the whisky is concerned.

Southern Iron Claims.—We are pleased to learn that Bishop Thomas Taylor has secured the United States patents to a number of his iron claims in Iron County, and expects before long to obtain the remainder. When he gets title of parties who are seeking to hamper him by delays and continuances, which he anticipates will be soon, he will have no difficulty in getting his patents for the whole of his claims. Bishop Taylor has shown much energy, pluck and determination in defending and securing this valuable property, and we wish him success. His claims have been pronounced by experts the finest in Iron County, and consequently as good as any in the world. In one of them, the "Blow Out," it has been computed that there is over 3,000,000 tons of the richest quality of ore in sight, assaying 70 per cent. of iron.

Mr. Taylor is determined to make iron. He would like to get help in the enterprise, but he is going to make it anyway. He informs us he is making preparations for taking down his blast furnace and erecting a large one, the rock for which he has had cut and hauled upon the ground during the past fall, ready for building as early as practicable in the coming spring. Had it not been for the jumping of his claims by A. G. Campbell & Co., he states that he would have been making iron to-day.

CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council, Tuesday evening, November 20th, 1883, Mayor Little, presiding:

A. McRea and thirty-three other citizens and taxpayers, residing in the vicinity of the junction of Sixth East and Second South Streets, submitted a petition setting forth that their supply of water in the winter season was very irregular and unreliable, and that many of them, separated from the mains, were particularly unable to lay pipes to their houses and obtain a supply of water in that way. They therefore asked the Council to authorize and require the proper officer to place a spill and tank at, or near the crossing at the junction of the above named streets, for the benefit of those persons of that locality who have not the waterworks extended to their residences. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

A petition was submitted signed by Joseph H. Evans and J. N. Russell, which asked the Council for a grant of all the coal which they might discover under the corporate grounds for the term of 20 years upon condition that they (the petitioners) pay to the city for all coal extracted from under the lands owned, the sum of 25 cents per ton. The signers represented that their request was based upon the supposition that they may hereafter be granted the right to mine coal, and controlled by the corporation, and they further represented that to grant their request would be to confer a blessing upon the people and produce a large revenue to the city for the benefit of all its inhabitants. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

Raleigh petitioned verbally in behalf of Jas. Townsend, asking certain modifications in the conditions of the lease granted him by the Council, to wit: That the Bath House property, which petition was granted and certain conditions of the lease modified.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom the petition of the verbal petition of Fred. Bohlwinkel, in relation to widening Apricot St., 19th Ward bench, reported that they had examined into the matter, and that the reason of the present extreme narrowness of said street was because blocks 20 and 21, plat "E," were made larger by occupancy than the plat, as surveyed by the city engineer, really prescribed. The committee therefore recommended that the city sell to the occupants of land in said blocks, or to some other person, such land as the city now rightfully own, and that with the revenue derived therefrom—or so much thereof as may be necessary—the city purchase of the owners of land on the south side of Apricot Street enough land to make said street the width originally surveyed, or at least three rods wide. The committee also recommended that Centre Street, plat "E," be improved as recommended in the report of the committee on streets and alleys, to wit: That the city, on or before the date April 1st, 1884, and that the water running on the east side of said street be kept upon that side and not be allowed to cross the street more than is necessary, and that the city watermaster be instructed to proceed to make the needed improvement in Centre Street as heretofore ordered by the Council.

A number of bills for court expenses in cases prosecuted by the city, appeared to the Third District Court, and there dismissed, were presented for allowance and referred to the committee on claims for investigation.

The city attorney, pursuant to instructions by the Council, presented a bill for an ordinance prohibiting the use of water from the Salt Lake City Water Works for certain purposes. The bill provides that after the 30th day of June, 1885, no license shall be granted to any person, firm or corporation to use water from the Salt Lake City Water Works for the purpose of driving any motor, turbine or other wheel, or any hydraulic engine, for the purpose of propelling machinery of any kind. The ordinance was read and considered and there deferred for two weeks.

Council adjourned for one week.

The Ogden Robbery.—The examination of Myer Seckel and Frank Treseder, for the robbing of Ambrose Greenwell, at Ogden, has developed a clear case against these couple of scoundrels. Seckel tells the whole story, implicating himself as well as his confederate. He stated that Treseder, aided by information given by himself, entered the house of Mr. Greenwell, took the money and divided it with him.

Treseder also made a confession, the only difference between his statement and Seckel's being that he alleged that his companion, not he, took the money, handed it to him, and the two divided it.

Three hundred and fifty dollars of the stolen money was found buried near a telegraph pole, a short distance from the Ogden iron works.

The accused were each committed to await the action of the grand jury in default of \$1,000 bail. They were brought down from Ogden last night by Sheriff Turner, and placed temporarily in the city jail. They were to be turned over to the U. S. Marshal to-day.

Treseder is an old offender, being well known in the police court of this city, and not unacquainted with the interior of the penitentiary.

About Railroads.—The Denver and Rio Grande R. R. Company has a corps of surveyors in the field running a line between Milford and Iron City, Iron County. They have reached Iron Springs, 50 miles south of Milford and ten miles this side of Iron City. The design is to build the road between these two points, and finally connect that portion with the line at Salina, Sevier County. A number of men are now at work in Clear Creek Cañon, at the part known as the narrow, the object evidently being to secure an important pass in that locality.

Iron City seems to be an important objective point for railroads. A line called the California Central, is also heading that way, for the purpose of connecting with the Utah Central there, when it reaches that section of the South.

Home from the North.—Brother Richard G. Lambert, who has been traveling in the north, in the interest of the News, has returned from his trip, which has been gratifyingly successful. He visited the cities, towns and settlements in Cache, Bear Lake and Bear River Valleys. He everywhere met with a kind reception. The cordiality with which he was treated is duly appreciated.

He informs us that business throughout the entire north is unusually brisk, and the people are everywhere manifesting much enterprise in building up the country.

Coal Business at Alma.—The Union Pacific R. R. Company is rushing the coal business at Alma. At one of the mines forty-five days, with a capacity of fourteen tons each, are got out daily.

Mandamus Case Decided.—The alternative mandamus case, in which Justice Pyper was required to appear and show cause why he should not be compelled, by peremptory mandate, to send the case of N. P. Gray, saloon keeper, to the District Court, on appeal, without the costs of the Justice Court being paid by the defendant, was decided this morning, by Judge Twigg. Justice Pyper appeared, through his attorneys, Messrs. Snow and Rawlins, demurred to the issuance of a mandamus, the Court sustained the demurrer. The proceeding against Gray was essentially a civil action, and the statute on the subject provides that the Justice cannot be compelled to take the steps necessary to perfect an appeal and send it to the superior court, unless the defendant first pay his costs.

Lamentation.—Last night the wires brought this repetition of a doleful tale from New York:

"A preacher from Ogden, Utah, addressed the Baptist pastors at their Conference yesterday. He said that the Baptists were the last to enter Utah and the Rocky Mountain region, but they seemed peculiarly adapted to the field. Half a million dollars had been spent in Salt Lake City, by different denominations, and the city was a city of churches. In connection with the churches, day schools were maintained, which exerted greater influence for good, apparently, than the churches themselves. The speaker said he organized his church with thirteen members, and it now had nineteen, and was the only church able to maintain prayer meetings. Other churches could not get more than four, or six at the outside together at prayer meeting. The Presbyterian church in Ogden acknowledged that there had not been since conversion in his church since it was established, four years ago. There was no Baptist church nearer to Ogden than Laramie, which is 400 miles away. The object of the preacher's visit East was, he said, to raise money to build a church."

The Baptist denomination's special adaptation to this field is not saying a great deal for the balance of the sects. Think of the noble 19. The admission that sectarian churches are comparatively useless is very frank. We are not prepared to controvert that point. The four to six at a prayer meeting statement has a lamentable look. It appears as if the sectarians were an irrelevant lot. Not a single conversion to Presbyterianism in Ogden in four years is likely to be correct. This does not show much progress. If that result be counted up in fifty years hence, it will be multiplying nothing by fifty and nothing remains. The fact that the nearest Baptist Church to Ogden is 400 miles away must be disconcerting to the nineteen, as it is to me, to go meeting. The speech wound up in the usual way, the object of the visit East was to RAISE MONEY to build a church in Utah. By all means, let the only generally prayerful, denominational people in Utah, numbering nineteen, have a church.
