Passed Un One of Best Systems For An Outside Firm.

The city council might have saved Salt Lake City \$10,000 and at the same time might have been ahead of its present record about eight or nine months. The council authorized its finance committee to spend \$5,000 for an audit of the city books and for suggestions from its accountants as to better methods of conducting the city's accounting system. The cost of the special auditors employed has already reached a little higher and higher. promises to climb higher and higher. A local accountant of undisputed ability entered a bid to do the work in three months' time at a cost to the city of \$4,000. He was turned down and a firm imported from St. Louis to do the mode firm imported from St. Louis to do the work. Already the city has lost nearly \$10,000 and a year has been spent by the auditors and they have not completed their work yet and the finance commit-tee does not expect them to for more than a month and even after that as-sistants will be retained in the service of the city at \$10 per day each to assist the salaried officials of the city in mak-ing the new system work smoothly. BID NOT ACCEPTED.

In November of 1906 Councilman Fer-ry introduced a resolution in the coun-cil by which the finance committee was ry introduced a resolution in the coun-ell by which the finance committee was authorized to employ a firm of compe-tent accountants to audit the city's books. The council at the same time set aside \$5,000 or so rpuch thereof as would be necessary to meet this ex-perse. The finance committee asked for bids for the work. There were many responses and among them a bid from a local man of competency, a rail-road accountant, and better systems of accounting than those in use by rail-roads there are not. His bid was for \$4,000, guaranteeing to finish the work in three months. He planned to do his work after office hours and any city officer or deputy who might be re-quired to go to his office in the evening to aid the auditors was to have been pald for his time out of the compensa-tion of the auditors. A competent force of railroad accountants was to do the work under the supervision of one of the best accountants in the Harri-man service, recognized generally as such. Among these accountants was a former auditor for the state of Iowa. THEY COME HIGH.

THEY COME HIGH.

Westerman & Trader, public ac-countants of undisputed ability in their line, also entered a bid. Their bid was such that no man could ever tell how much it would amount to. In its terms much it would amount to. In its terms the accountant in charge was to be pild \$16 per day for seven hours' work, as-sistants were to receive \$10 for the same amount of work and when either member of the firm performed work he was to receive \$20 per day of seven hours. No estimate of the time that might be consumed was made and therefore no estimate of the cost to the city was possible. Still, the finance committee was possible. Still, the cost to the committee waded into the contract with Westerman & Trader, not knowing how large a figure the expense would reach. This was in February last.
