To all those who continued their time as well as their brains to help accomplish this work, the people of Salt Lake owe a debt of gratitude which I feel sure they will not be unwilling to pay.

There are just as important issues ahead for the transportation bureau as what has already been handled, and no thought should be given to discontinuing this valuable organization or weakening its effective force.

The work of the secretary's office proper has been more of a routine nature, many inquiries have been made covering the whole range of business and investment pertaining to this great country.

During the year sixteen new members have been elected to our list, all of whom are active business men. I would recommend that each active member contribute himself a committee of one during the coming year to secure for the chamber a new active member.

Since our last annual meeting we have been deprived by death of three valuable members, namely, Messrs. O. J. Hollister, F. H. Dyer and W. H. Johnston. The good work they did while living and their noble example as public spirited gentlemen are known to this community, and nothing that can be said here could add to the lustre of their names or increase the appreciation of their services to the country.

At the commencement of 1892 we started out with a floating fund amounting to \$2,044.00, which has been reduced to \$1,095.00, deducting the cash on hand on January 1st, 1893, a reduction during the year of \$1,049.00.

Officers Elected. Fred Wilson called attention to the fact that a business men's association had been organized in this city recently, and thought that the business interests of the city could be better ad-

vanced by consolidating all such movements within the Chamber of Commerce, which had a beautiful building of its own and was in every way well equipped to carry on the work for which it had been organized.

First Simon then placed President Donnell's name before the chamber for re-election but that gentleman positively declined to become a candidate. A. E. De Riegels nominated Horst M. Wells. J. K. Gillespie named Walter E. Hubbard. Mr. Clarke nominated W. H. Howe for first vice president, and J. S. Cameron and George A. Laws were nominated for second vice president.
