

SEQUEL TO A FIRE.

Louis Keller Sued by the German-American Insurance Company.

RAISING UP ANGRY OF THE PAST.

It is Claimed That the Defendant Obtained Insurance Money by False Representations.

Chief Justice Merrill and a jury have been engaged the entire day on the trial of an action brought by the German-American Insurance Company of New York against Louis Keller, the ex-convict and fireburner of Healdville, Mo., to recover the sum of \$1,000, paid over to the defendant as insurance money, and which he represented to have been the property of the company's insured.

Although Arthur Brown, H. W. Young and Oscar W. Mayhew are for the plaintiff Judge Powers and Attorney S. H. Lewis have the case for the defendant in hand.

The suit arises out of a fire which occurred on premises formerly occupied by the defendant at 15 west first South street, in the month of July, 1895, known as the "Kendall-Kelly-Kellogg" and which resulted in the destruction of the building and the contents thereof. On June 13th, of the year named, the defendant entered into a contract as tenant with Mrs. Victoria A. Keller, his mother, at \$100 per month, and on the 15th of the same month he was notified by her that the building was to be sold to the plaintiff.

It is claimed that the defendant obtained the insurance money by false representations, and that he was guilty of arson. The defendant denies the charges and claims that the building was destroyed by lightning.

The plaintiff claims that the defendant was guilty of arson and that he obtained the insurance money by false representations. The defendant denies these charges.

The trial is expected to continue for several days. The jury will hear testimony from both sides and will render a verdict.

Objections to the Stock Yards as the Only Point of Inspection.

IT WOULD BE GREAT HARDSHIP.

Allegation that the Scheme is in the Interest of Heavily Taxed Salt of the People.

Some of the local butchers and a good many others are combing for a solution of the problem of the City Council's sanitary committee to select the Utah stock yards in Davis county as the only point of inspection for animals to be used as food in this city. The law passed at the last legislative session provides for the inspection of animals and stock and the selection of one or more places for such inspection.

The purpose of the law is to protect the public health and to prevent the spread of disease. The law requires that all animals to be used for food must be inspected and found to be healthy before they can be sold.

It is claimed that the stock yards will be the only place where a point of inspection can be had. The yards are heavily taxed and it is claimed that the scheme is in the interest of the heavily taxed salt of the people.

The yards are located in Davis county and are owned by the Utah Stock Yards Company. The company is a corporation organized in Utah and has a capital of \$1,000,000.

There is an added statement to the effect that the local butchers and others who are opposed to the yards are doing so in the interest of the heavily taxed salt of the people.
