LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.
Police Court.—Several assault and battery cases are being disposed of by Justice Pyper to-day.

Runaways.—A trifling runaway occurred to-day, but the horses were fortunately stopped before any damage was done.

A number of accidents happened on Saturday evening, caused by horses becoming frightened and unmanageable; but two damaged vehicles are the only results of the disasters.

The Burton Trial.—This afternoon's session of the Third District court will probably be occupied in hearing the last testimony in the Burton case, after which Mr. Beatty will make his argument for the prosecution. The witnesses this morning were called to give the number of the posse who were in the fort at the time of the surrender, this point, it seems, being considered very important. To nearly all the questions asked, the defense entered objections, on the ground mentioned in our court proceedings in another part of this paper, which were overruled. Judge Van Zile at one point, incidentally stated that it had recently come to his knowledge that the posse who accompanied Gen. Burton on this expedition consisted simply of the Nauvoo Legion. No proof, however, was adduced in support of this remark.

Educational.—The Salt Lake County Educational Association met on Saturday, in the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms, Prof. T. B. Lewis presiding.

Dr. J. M. Benedict, who was announced to speak on the duties of trustees, proceeded to do so, and some of the points he touched upon were well chosen and well explained. His ideas respecting the education of the people were, however, not so well received, and were replied to by

Mr. J. Z. Stewart, of Draper, whose remarks on the moral and religious instruction in common schools were presented with force and perspicuity.

An excellent address on prizes and their effects was delivered by Mr. R. H. Smith. He said that unless prizes were distributed in a careful and proper manner, they would be the means of doing more harm than good, and that as far as possible they should be given for general good conduct and attention, rather than for excellence in one particular branch of study.

A brief discussion ensued on the merits of the school law, after which, at Mr. Fuller's suggestion, a committee was appointed to examine this law and report upon it.

The president made a few remarks in reply to Dr. Benedict's ideas, and the meeting adjourned for two weeks.

Proceedings to-day.

The defense desired to introduce evidence to the effect that Mr. H. W. Lawrence, Territorial Marshal, was absent from the Territory at the time of the service of these writs, but this fact was conceded by the prosecution. The prosecution then proceeded to call witnesses for rebuttal, and

WAS FIRST SWORN: Live in this city; remember the Morristide trouble in June, 1862; was at the Morristide camp as a member of Gen. Burton's posse; was in the infantry; was there during the three days.

"How many men did you have there?"
This was objected to by the defense and Judge Tifford stated the objections; that it was not a subject of rebuttal; all these facts were testified to before by Canonville and others; to show the number of the posse was a very important point of the case and as it was not introduced in the opening of the case it cannot now be brought forward.

Mr. J. H. Beatty for the prosecution stated the case for his side and read a statute on the subject; stated that was the very foundation, make this point a particular one, but the defense have done so and we should therefore be allowed to introduce rebutting evidence upon this point.

The point was further argued by Judge Tifford, and the objection was overruled. To this the defense excepted.

The examination was resumed: Should judge there were 500 men at least, perhaps 600; I was on the west side of the fort; witness pointed out on the map where he was stationed. The witness was asked in regard to a charge on a log house and this question was objected to by the defense and was argued by Judge Tifford and sustained; Judge Van Zile replied for the prosecution, and the objection was overruled.

Witness resumed; remember the charge upon the house, was one of those who made the charge; the house was about 60 to 70 yards from the end of the lane; heard no conversation between the fugitives and anybody; next saw the flag going back into the fort; I saw several men run, one was shot, from the house north side of the house where we were; he was running toward the bower when he was shot; the first I saw, about 25 to 50 men passed into the fort; afterwards the horsemen came along, then we came out of the log house and followed them; the lane was full of men running; I did not hear the shooting; I was on the north side of the school-house; when I got there there were fully 100 men there; I was there within a few seconds of the horsemen; there were four horsemen; there were fully 100 men there and they were drawn in a line between the arms and the Morristide; I went around on the east side and have a slight recollection of hearing shooting; I saw the horses jumping and saw a man and woman lying dead; at the north end I saw a large crowd of excited Morristides; stayed there from one to two miles; saw a crowd of excited Morristides; I should suppose there were at least five hundred men there in the posse; do not know how many companies or how many captains were there; I was in Mr. Lewis' company; I think he was a lieutenant; 25 men were selected to take this house; after Mr. Jones, I think Mr. Lewis was first; Mr. Jones went along and did not know all the 25 men; most all the men in the house followed the horsemen into the fort; do not know how many officers served on the west side; do not know Cunningham; I was subject to Lewis' orders; I do not know how many were under his command.

Witness resumed: Had been in the country about seven months; came from Indiana, and originally from England; Mr. Lewis, a neighbor of mine, called upon me with a paper to get me to serve in the posse; was not a member of the organization, and objected to going.

By a juror: Saw the man running who was shot; I did not see him fall; I saw him at the time he was shot; he was running at the time, and fell where he was shot; the house was about 14 by 16 or 18; the logs ran horizontally, and the chinking was out between them.

MR. ABRAHAM TAYLOR
Was sworn: Live in this city; was in the Morristide camp when Burton's posse came there; I was in there at the time of the surrender; I went to where the Morristides were congregating; Gen. Burton passed on the north side of the school-house; he did not pass the east end; when I saw Gen. Burton could not say how many were there; I saw them; I went back to the east side of the school-house before the firing; there I could see them better, and should say there were two or three hundred; the Burton posse stood between us and our arms.
