Only on the assumption that the source of terrible heat is directly in the sun and due to an extraordinary increase in its effective radiation can the widespread and long continued nature of the present meteor-ological disaster be satisfactorily explained

"All astronomers know that the face of the sun is blanketed with absorb ing vapors, while its interior is much hotter than the glowing shell that we see. Strip off the vaporous blanket en tirely and the surface of the earth would probably burst into smoke and flame in the instantaneous gush of unbearable heat that would be poured up-

"Whenever, as occurs periodically, though not always to the same extent, the solar vapors are thinner, the heat from within leaps out through the weakened shell and strikes the eartu

and the other nearby planets as with a breath of fire from the suddenly opened door of a blazing furnace "That is what has happened this summer, and the immediate agency

that has flung open the furnace doors and sent forth the destroying blast is the mysterious power whose variable manifestation is the presence of black sun spots. But it is a mistake to sup pose that the sun spots themselves exer-cle any direct influence upon the weather or that there must be spots on the sun whenever there is extraordinary

heat on the earth. "The spots are simply indicators of the sun's condition, resembling in that respect the eruptions on the face of a smallpox patient. They tell the story of 'the sun's internal convulsions and indicate some of the places on its sur face where the pentup forces are bursting

"For the next four years these gigantic outbrusts will increase in fury, and a corresponding series of terrestrial seasons marked by great excesses of temperature, sudden contrasts and extradinary cyclonic diturbances will fol-

### YELLOW FEVER NEAR HAVANA All Cases Were Those of Unaccli-

mated Spaniards. New York, July 24 .- A dispatch to the Tribune from Havana says: The five cases of yellow fever which broke out in the cigar factories of the Havana Commercial company at Santiago de las Vegas, a suburb of Havana, were all

were brought to the Spaniards. Four cases were brought to the Spanish hospital at Havana un-reported by the physicians, but the American sanitary authorities made the discovery. Santiago is in a bad sanitary condition, containing 300 non immune Spaniards. No yellow fever is reported to exist in this city.

Paterno Will Form New Party.

Manila, July 24 .- The Libertad is authority for the statement that Senor Paterno will leave the Federal party and will organize what he calls the Nationalists on a platform resembling that of the Conservatives with Aguinaldo as president and former insurgent military officers and former members of the Federal party as leaders. The purpose f the new party will be the ultimate independence of the Philippines. This coincides with Senor Paterno's policy,as he has been making efforts to induce Againaldo to unite with the new party.

**Opposition** to Ship Canal Project.

New York, July 24 .- Strong opposi-tion to the ship canal project was expressed at a meeting yesterday of the sub-executive committee of the Greater New York Canal association and the Canal committee exchange. The nur pose of the conference was to consider the report of the deepwater way commission on the ship canal proposition. After a prolonged discussion of the subject it was unanimously decided to
