who did not, can write their names, the numbers of the compa-nies they were in, the names of their captains, the time of their enlistments and their discharges, to Hon. Ezra B. French, Second Auditor of the Treasury, Washing-tom City, and if there is anything due to them, he will forward them the necessary blapks to fill out by due to them, he will forward them the necessary blanks to fill out, by which they can get their pay. In this way they can save the expense of employing a claim agent to get the money for them. If our Dele-gate should be in Washington, he could doithis business for them, but as it is quite uncertain how long Congress will remain in session, he has seen the Second Auditor upon the subject, and he has suggested that the officers and soldiers of the Battalion who have not had their pay, write to him as described above.
