WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the North Pacific states, central valley and lake region, and lowest over the North Atlantic states, southern plateau, northern Rocky Mountain slope, and Mexico.

Precipitation occurred over portions of the plateau region, Rocky Mountain slope, Missouri valley, extreme northwest, lower lake region, gulf and Atlantic states, with heavy rain at Scranton, Pa., 1.12 inches. It was raining at number of stations. A wind storm occurred at Salt Lake City, with a maximum wind of 44 miles.

The temperature fell 10 deg. or more over portions of the North Pacific states, plateau region, and New York, with slight changes elsewhere.
