Precipitation occurred over portions of the plateau region, Rocky Mountain slope, Missouri valley, central valleys, lower lake region, gulf and Atlantic states, with heavy rain at Scranton, Pa., 1.12 inches. It was raining this morning at Havre, Omaha, and Boston.

Thunderstorms were reported at a number of stations. A wind storm occurred at Salt Lake City, with a maximum velocity of 44 miles.

The temperature fell 10 deg. or more over portions of the North Pacific states, plateau region, and New York, with slight changes elsewhere.

FROM AGENT TO GENERAL MANAGER

Big Jump by Geo. W. Vallery, The Denver Burlington Representative.

GOES TO COLORADO MIDLAND.

Succeeds C. H. Schlacks, Who Was Recently Appointed Operating Head Of Denver & Rio Grande.

From general agent to general manager is what has happened to George W. Vallery of the Burlington at Denver. Effective at once, Mr. Vallery

has been appointed general manager of the Colorado Midland to succeed C. H. Schlacks, recently made vice president and general manager of the Denver & Rio Grande and vice president of the Utah Fuel company.

The announcement comes as a great surprise to the many friends of Mr. Vallery in Salt Lake as it is seldom that a railroad man makes such a terrific jump. In his case it is one of sheer merit that has pushed him to the front. In 1888 when he was general agent for the Burlington in Salt Lake he demonstrated that he was a hustler and since his removal to Denver in a similar capacity he has proved that he is a good man, so much so that for some time past he has been the recipient of the highest salary paid to a general agent in the West.

The new general manager of the Midland has long been looked upon as a Salt Lake especially after he married a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Fickard of this city. It was he also who organized the Utah corporation which is still in existence, and is destined one day to form part and parcel of the Burlington extension. He was also one of the original incorporators of the now famous duck club which has its quarters at the mouth of the Bear river.

Change in Double Service.

It was decided yesterday afternoon that the double train service between Salt Lake and Brigham would be instituted without change of cars. Accordingly commencing tomorrow the Rio Grande will run two passenger trains daily at 8 a. m. and 3 p. m.

Big R. G. W. Excursion.

The Jordan stake excursion to Capitol Springs this morning proved to be the banner one for the Rio Grande this season. In all 1,000 passengers boarded the specials at Bingham Junction and Sandy, while nearly 500 joined the merry throng at Riverton and Ogden. General Agent Benton of the passenger department and Messrs. Ridd and Cushing accompanied the trains and looked after the comfort of the excursionists.

Elks Go East.

The special train with 100 California Elks, en route to the meeting at Cincinnati, passed through Ogden at 3 o'clock today. The train is one of the most elegant sent over the road and consists of four standard Pullman palace sleepers, dining car, composite library car, and baggage car. The train is thoroughly stocked with California wines and flowers.

Wants Books Produced.

Boston, July 13.—A bill in equity has been filed in the supreme court by Andrew B. Blume, holder of 1,000 shares of Mexican Central railway stocks, to compel the production of the company's books in an effort to ascertain the significance of certain acts of the directors. These acts, which were ratified by the stockholders at the meeting held here May 4, relate to the term of office for which the directors should be elected. The order is returnable July 19.
