

THE STRANGE SUICIDE.
Body of the Unknown Was Buried In
a Cooper's Vault After the
Cremator's Ignorance.

The body of the stranger, who was found from the waters of the Jordan river at Ninth North so suddenly was buried in a Cooper's vaults for safety, leaving his possessions after the holding of an inquest by Coroner Oberholser. Nothing was admitted as to the man's identity beyond the finding of a few articles in his pockets. This is the first time in the Jordan river at Ninth North, the day he committed suicide by jumping from the White Bridge into the "rolling stream."
