LOCAL BRIEFS.

Local bankers report money easy and in good demand by many classes of people for a wide variety of business purposes.

DeWitt Knox, son of President Frank Knox of the Bank of the Republic, has won a loving cup, in a series of athletic contests at Phillips academy, Andover, Mass.

R. H. Lloyd of the Denver Hotel Bulletin is in the city, and reports over 25,000 eastern people are having arrived at Los Angeles in the last three weeks, thus filling local hotels.

Rev. Dr. Utter of Denver preaches tomorrow morning in the Unitarian church in this city, and Rev. F. E. Eddy will occupy Dr. Utter's pulpit in Denver.

City Food Inspector Myers reports that the milk supply is in fine shape, and that the article sold in this city by all dairies is absolutely pure and above reproach.

Clerks from the postoffice are busy arranging the new fixtures and office equipment at the federal building, so that the coming move may be made with the least possible loss of time.

Five and 10 days respectively in the county jail are the sentences passed upon James Gillen and Richard Anderson, who were found guilty of disturbing the peace at Farmers ward yesterday.

"The Demons Defeated" will be the subject of Dr. Talmage's lecture at the University Sunday school tomorrow. Special music will be provided. Application for leaflets should be made to Mr. John U. Hicks, L. D. S. University.

The funeral of Wiley Brown was held at 2 p. m. today, from the great room of S. D. Evans, with interment at Mt. Olivet. The family of the deceased refused to recognize any notices sent them from this city regarding the deceased.

Clerk Judd of the board of education today issued warrants for the payment of the salaries of the officers of the board and janitors of the schools for the month of November. The amount of the janitors' payroll is \$241.47 and of the janitors' \$1,750.10.

The dry goods men express themselves as feeling good over the great run of business for the fall trade. It seems to be satisfactory in all lines, although there is not so much demand for the heavy goods at present as there will be a little later on. There is a steady call reported for silk goods of all kinds.

Local wholesale druggists say that the handling of Christmas novelties has practically passed out of the hands of the wholesale trade, although the retailers are still dealing in them more or less. The argument is that jobbers have made of these novelties and notions such a special that the wholesale druggists can not compete.

There are complaints that creamery butter is being sold at 14 ounces instead of 16, and at 25 cents per pound. The city food inspector is after such frauds as this, and has succeeded in making it warm for fraudulent dealers of late. He has driven the Denver Oslo man out of the Salt Lake market, and has made it so hot for the imitation "farmer's butter" men that they have gone elsewhere.

Contracts have been let by the regents of the University of Utah for the building of a pipe line to the university to give improved water service in the laboratories, the piping to be furnished by the Anderson-Calister Investment company. The cement work necessary at the university went to Clement and Strang of Salt Lake, while the supervision of it was granted to Lyman and Wilson hydraulic engineers of Salt Lake.

Bradstreet's agency in New York has published a large sized, 96 page pamphlet of their executive half tones of the larger business, public and private structures in Greater New York. On the frontispiece is the proposed new City Hall, 45 stories high. The immense number of skyscrapers is something remarkable, and the down town streets appear to be the veriest canyons.

Local photographers say that it is almost impossible to get a good photograph of Salt Lake City for the reason that there is so much smoke from the chimneys and smoke and haze from the shutters. Either one or both are constantly present, and if by any possible chance they are absent for a very brief time, the sun is sure to be in such a position as to make it impossible for the camera to catch the best effects.

President Frank Knox of the National Bank of the Republic left Thursday for the west. He will be joined at Chicago by Landlord G. S. Holmes of the Knutsford, and the two will reach Boston in time to enjoy a Thanksgiving dinner with Mr. Knox's two sons who are preparing at Phillips Academy for Yale at Phillips Executive academy. Messrs. Knox and Holmes will be away about a month.
