Passed Away After a Long Suffering From a Complication of Diseases.

GEORGE HURST, California's Democratic Senator Passed Away.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Senator George Hurst of California died at his residence in New Hampshire Avenue at 10 o'clock to night. He had been ill for some time, and in December last went to New York City to consult with Dr. Charles Ward. The physician found that he was afflicted with a complication of diseases, including primarily a serious degeneration of the bronchi. Acting upon the physician's advice, he returned to his family in this city and yielded himself entirely to medical treatment. Absolute quietude and rest were insisted upon, and his official duties suspended as much as possible. Notwithstanding that he had no other serious ailment, most careful nursing and most skillful medical attention, a steady and untiring devotion to his recovery, and it was several weeks before that the case was a hopeless one.

Within the last day or two there was a change for the worse. This evening he was rapidly, and the family was summoned to his bedside. These persons were J. E. George Hurst was born in Franklin, Mass., Sept. 1, 1828. His father had gone to California from North Carolina in 1829. This son received only such a liberal education as the common school afforded at that time. He was educated at his father's farm until 1846, when he sought the gold fever and went to California.

For several years he was a miner and prospector, and subsequently by location and purchase became the owner of considerable mining interests and a large employer, having at one time as many as 200 men at work in his mine alone.

He was also interested in a large tract of land near Yuma, and to this building in 1857. He died at the time of his death was estimated at \$200,000.

Mr. Hurst's political life began in 1857, when he was elected to the California Legislature, and served one term. In 1861 he was a candidate for the Democratic State convention for governor, but was defeated by Gen. George Washington.

The latter was elected governor and while by the death of United States Senator John F. Miller, in 1883, the power of appointing a senator was given to the people by the former, Senator Hurst was elected to the office.

He was a man of action rather than of words. He took but little part in the debates of the Senate. He was a weak voice, but when he did address the Senate his speech was always a stirring appeal.
