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
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

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec., 18.—In the big railroad suit to day Roberts explained at length his official relations with the Pennsylvania Bailroad and other corporations, defendants in the suit. He told where the lines of the company ran as well as those of its connections, nearly a score in number, including nearly all the important lines east of St. Louis. The Pennsylvania cast of St. Louis. The Pennsylvania Company was a large stockholder in many of them. Witness was chairman of the Presidents' Committee of the Trunk Line Pool, and Albert Fink was Commissioner of the pool with a salary of \$10,000 or \$15,000.
