Whereas, the said state board of health in limiting their assumed authority exclusively to the schools while all other assemblies are permitted to congregate without hindrance, has perpetrated an act of odious discrimina-tion unwarranted by law, reason or neof the rights and privileges of child-

d and youth,

Whereas, attempts are now being made to induce your honorable body to perpetuate by law the abominable pracice of compulsory vaccination and thus legalize and sanctify the abhorent des-potism of the state board of health against the protests of your constitu-ents, Whereas the local boards of health are closely identified and inter-ested personally and officially in the seurity and maintenance of health within their respective jurisdictions. There-fore we now do in grave seriousness petition your honorable body to at once stamp with disapproval the oppressive course taken by the state board of health, its supporters and coadjutors by creating a law curtailing the powers of said board within just and humane limits, and conferring on local boards of health power and authority to deter-mine the health condition of their re-spective jurisdictions, to enforce sanitary regulations and quarantine measures and to suspend the time of all gatherings when in their judgment the safety of the public health demands. CALLS FORT.

IMPROVEMENTS BY THE WAY. Fine Pumping Outfit on Farm of Joseph Yates.

Special Correspondence. Calls Fort, Boxelder Co., Jan. 23 .- A journey from Beaver through Collinston, Dewey, Honeyville to this place upon the highway, although in a drizzling rain, is full of interest. Coming once a year or so, a person who travels with his eyes open notes many improvements as the years come and go. Calling upon my long life friend calling upon my long life friend Joseph Yates, Esq., and looking over his fine farm and two or three hundred head of fine cattle (Mr. Yates was chosen Boxeldercounty adelegate to the cattle convention). I saw something that I believe will be of great benefit to a large number of the 21,000 readers of the Deseret News.

It is a one horse tread-power success pump. The full cost of which delivered bere was \$150 complete, tread power and pump. It is of more value many times over than any wind mill, as be-ing always sure. The important part is the well and its size. Mr. Yates dug his well close to the east mountains. It was twelve feet across, and a two foot rock wall made a clear space of eight feet, thirty-three feet deep with three feet of water. This pump has been in operation since March 1, 1900, and has never failed. Its capacity is and has never falled. Its capacity is fifty gallons per minute and is capable of furnishing water for any garden or orchard of five acres. Now let me tell the dry farmers of these Rocky Mountain States what Mr. Yates waters from this pump. He had from two to three hundred head of stock to water, and driving these dall- all over his lucern falds to the water dich they not only ields to the water ditch they not only spoiled the land but tore the embank ments down. Muddied the stream and it took a man half of each day to attend this duty, as they had to go in three or four divisions so as to prevent mixing of the cattle.

Now, Mr. Yates has built a house over his pump having three windows.

The horse is placed on the power.

The horse is placed on the power. The pumps are started and the horse can pump sufficient water in one hour through a two inch pipe into proper cisterns to water 500 head of cattle. The water is warm in winter and cool in

The nump can be stopped by placing the little finger of your hand upon the lever. The pumps work smoothly and the horse came out from an hour's work without a wet hair. The effect upon the tattle by being watered at their leisure in their own yard is fully a 25 per cent gain in lieu of driving. In summer Mr. Yates after sun down in one hour irrigates his orchard and gar-
