C., Sept. 12.—The Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Capons, has written a circular letter to all internal revenue collectors and inspectors in which he outlines the policy to be followed in the search for violators of the law. He says that the position to make a record of subjects their failure to produce evidence and expense, makes a perfect record in the courts of their guilt and activity in evading assessments, making the property of law-abiding citizens, who are endeavoring to live under the law in a business-like and honest manner, in any of their business open to suspicion.

The letter adds: "I have on my desk the record of a case where three revenue agents of their employees, being around a registered distiller looking for some sign of violation on the part of the book-keeper, for three weeks, while during that time there were five blockades (unlawful distilleries) in full operation within seven miles of the registered distiller. By the operation of these unlawful distilleries the government was losing probably \$100 a day as tax on the whiskey they were producing, while these revenue agents were sitting about for 'big game,' the registered distiller.

INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION REPORT.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The interstate commerce commission today made public an abstract of its nineteenth annual statistical report, covering the year ending June 30, 1906, showing the par value of railroad capital outstanding was \$14,579,421,478, or \$47,936 per mile of the railroads in the United States. The report also shows that the aggregate gross earnings from the operated lines, 222,340,000 of lines, were \$22,325,750,165, being \$24,382,761 greater than in 1905. Their operating expenses were \$13,921,071, or \$44,254,119 more than in 1905. The net earnings aggregated \$7,888,887,586, an increase of \$7,067,042. The net earnings per mile of line averaged \$45.48. The income attributable to other sources than operating is reported at \$206,539,531.
