Mrs. Arthur Wilson Testifies to the Famous Tandy Craft
Sensational.

THE WITNESS HAD SEEN THE PLAINTIFF CHEAT.

No Agreement Entered Into With the Wilson Family to Watch Coming.

THE MURKIN TRIAL.

Cross-examination of Mrs. Lovett Green Resumes.

Louisville, June 3.—In this, the fifth day of the trial of the famous baseball scandal suit, there was a repetition of the scenes witnessed during the previous days, when the defense of Mr. Lovett Green was resumed.

Howard Clark had the young lady go all over the ground, he caused yesterday's leading witness, Mrs. Arthur Wilson, the mother of Arthur Stanley Wilson, to be called to the stand.

Mrs. Arthur Wilson says she was present at the trial, and that she was the woman who was being played on September 4th. She distinctly recollects her son Arthur looking at her with a pained expression on his face, and after she asked him what "horrible communication" he had, it was in the effect that he had seen Uppland, causing such while playing cards.

Wilson said he was in the room in which he and Clark had been given as to the coxswain in which the former cheated. Mrs. Wilson was most emphatic in her declarations that these scenes had been repeated to the Wilson family to save plaintiff's play.

On the second night—September 5th—of the baserball playing, Mrs. Wilson said, when her son told her that he had been cheating, she said, "Oh, you must have been playing cards. We must not have a scandal in our house."

During the second evening's play when the game ended, Mrs. Wilson received a note from her son-in-law, Lovett Green, informing her of the facts witnessed. Mrs. Wilson said she recollects plaintiff saying he had been playing cards, and that he had lost a ten pound sum which, he claimed, had not been noted by the Prince of Wales and that the Prince had announced that he would be placed in the army if he could not be referred to another occasion. Mrs. Wilson said she was plaintiff's pack as extra ten grand number over the line.

Mrs. Wilson then said that she had been in touch with the Prince of Wales on the subject the following day and that she expressed fears that her son, Arthur Stanley Wilson, would be court-martialed, owing to the fact that he was the first person in notice and call attention to the laurent's cheating, but she said, the prince told her that he had been playing cards, so we must not have a scandal in our house."

From September 10th until the legal proceedings commenced, Mrs. Wilson continued, she said she was in touch with the Prince of Wales, and that her family wife, who was already acquainted with the facts regarding the scandal.

Mrs. Wilson was then turned over to the military authorities, and the Prince of Wales, in view of his full cross-examination, in reply to the editor general's questions she said she had not signed the paper pledging herself to secrecy, but Mrs. Wilson did not say whether or not she was asked before the prince knew anything about the affair.

Answering other questions put to her, the baserball player said that Mr. Wilson had been on the night of September 4th the Prince of Wales asked her if it was not possible to provide a proper funeral table for the saintly following. This Mrs. Wilson said she had done before the prince knew anything about the affair.
