

THE BIBLE AND POLYGYAMY. THE LECTURE IN THE TWELFTH WARD.

Last evening the main Hall of the Twelfth Ward Assembly Rooms was literally packed with people who assembled to listen to the discourse announced to be delivered by Elder John Nicholson upon "Does the Bible sanction and sustain Polygamy?"

The speaker made a few introductory remarks, announcing that it was not his purpose to advocate any particular form of marriage, but to explain the position of the scriptures in reference to what is known as the patriarchal or plural system, more commonly denominated polygamy.
