The most reliable news from the strick-en center received by the vice consul was to the effect that the entire city of Palmoli was inundated by a tidal wave and all its inhabitants lost.

When the unfortunate man was in-formed of the total loss of his family, it was thought at first for a time that he would go insane, but with the kind and faithful care of friends he recovred and is now making preparations to go to Italy.
