MARKET VERY EXCITED.

In Union Pacific Excitement So Great That Opening Quotations Were Almost Lost.

Professional Operators Prepared to Unload on Outsiders - Gains in Market for Bonds.

New York, Nov. 7 .- The stock market opened with excited trading and upward movement of prices. The movement was anticipated in the American department in London, where prices rose buoyantly over Monday's level, after having been rather acutely depressed yesterday, while the New York stock exchange-was closed. In the opening dealings in many stocks quotations were wide, simultaneous prices being paid at a variention of as much as 11/2 points. First sales ran as high as 8,000 shares in Atchison, which was quoted at 34%@35%, compared with 33% on Monday. Pennsylvania jumped 21/2 and New York Central 1%. A number of other railroad stocks rose from 1 to 11/2: Prices in the industrial department were even more buoyant, especially in the steel stocks. Tobacco advanced 4%, Con. Tob. 21/2 and Manhaitan 2 points. There were sharp re-actions immediately after the opening, running to a point in a few industrials.

In Union Pacific the excitement was so great that opening quotations were almost lost, 15,000 shares being traded in the opening dealings. The quotation was 65 to 64½, compared with 68¾ on Monday. Professional operators were prepared to unload on the outside demand and enormous blocks were sold. This condition caused a general re-action, which was severe in some of the Losses in the railroads did not reach above a fraction except in isolated cases.
