

LYNCH TO BE RE-SENTENCED.

Convicted Slayer of Col. Godfrey
Pronounced Will Stand Before
Judge Booth Tomorrow.

JUDGE STEWART SO ORDERS.

Expected That the Condemned Man
Will Make a Speech Before the
Death Sentence is Passed.

Upon motion of Dist. Atty. Eichenor, Judge Stewart this morning issued an order to Sheriff Emery and Warden Dow directing them to bring James Lynch before Judge Booth in the criminal division of the district court tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock to be re-sentenced. It is expected that Lynch will make a speech before the court again passes the death sentence upon him.

JUDGMENT REVERSED.

Supreme Court Instructs That Demurrer
In Ash Case be Overruled.

The supreme court has reversed the judgment of the lower court in the case of the Nelson-Judson Drug company et al., appellants, vs. the Commercial National bank of Ogden and R. T. Hume, administrator of the estate of Shirley P. Ash, deceased. The action was brought to annul a chattel mortgage executed by Ash in favor of the bank upon a stock of drugs. It was also asked by plaintiffs that the claim of the bank be not classed as a preferred lien over that of other creditors of Ash. In the lower court a demurrer to the complaint was sustained and judgment entered in favor of defendants for costs of suit. This judgment the supreme court reversed with instructions to the lower court to overrule the demurrer and proceed with the trial of the issues. The opinion of the court was written by Justice Beach and concurred in by Chief Justice Baskin and Justice McCarty.

Johan Starr Sues.

The Utah Consolidated Mining company has been made defendant in a damage suit filed in the district court by Johan Starr to recover \$1,500 for personal injuries received while employed in defendant's mine on Aug. 27, 1903. Plaintiff's leg was broken and he was otherwise crushed by falling ore.

Judgment for Plaintiff.

Judge Hall this morning rendered a decree in favor of plaintiff in the case of S. G. Paul against L. H. Hodge and wife. It is decreed that defendants be required to redeem lots 7 to 13, inclusive, Martin's subdivision of the west half of block 35, plat C, from sheriff's sale within three months from this date for the sum of \$500. Upon failure of defendants to so redeem the property, the title to the same shall be quieted in plaintiff.

Federal Court Cases.

The damage suit of J. S. Young vs. the Southern Pacific, tried in the federal court yesterday, resulted in a ver-

dict for defendant, the court having so instructed the jury.
The time of the federal court today was taken up in the hearing of the cases of Silverman Bros., wool merchants of Chicago, against John H. Reeder and Charles C. Carter to recover \$2,044.50 and \$4,206.75 respectively, money advanced on the purchase price of certain quantities of wool.

Injunction Suit Heard.

The injunction suit of Sarah A. Gibbs et al., vs. the Rio Grande Western Railway company et al., was again taken up by Judge Hall this morning and the introduction of testimony in the case proceeded with. It is expected that it will take several days to complete the case.

COURT NOTES.

The damage suit of J. S. Young against the Southern Pacific Railway company occupied the entire time of the federal court yesterday. Plaintiff sues to recover for injuries received through being struck by a spike while working on the Lucin cut-off.

L. L. Mills filed suit for divorce today in the district court against Cora E. Mills on the ground of desertion. They were married in Independence, Kan., on July 28, 1894, and it is alleged that defendant deserted her husband on Sept. 1, 1898.

Claudia McNeill has filed a petition in the district court for letters of administration of the estate of John McNeill, deceased, who died in Park City on Nov. 8, 1903. The estate consists of cash in bank amounting to \$200 and real estate valued at \$2,000. There are five heirs to the estate. The petition will be heard on Friday, Nov. 27.

The coal situation continues unchanged from what it was yesterday, and dealers say there will be no further advances this winter. Present prices are here to stay until the flowers bloom in the spring.

All of the second story steel of the Federal building is now in place, and the second story walls are going up. The structure has now reached a point where some adequate idea of its imposing character can be had.

The contract given to Engdahl & Rudine of this city for the mason work on the Y. M. C. A. building, covers the mason work, and is for \$23,000. The contract for the carpenter work will be let later.

State Auditor Tingey is having his record of marks and brands recorded in his office between June 1, 1902, and Oct. 1, 1903, published in pamphlet form for distribution among the stockmen of the state. It is expected that the pamphlet will be ready in about two weeks.

An electric candle is in the market that looks like the ordinary wax taper set in the candlestick. The device contains a small battery, while at the apex of the candle is a small incandescent lamp, and by pressing the thumb it is made to glow. The battery will run for eight hours.

The excavating gangs of the Independent Telephone company have reached the Pioneer monument, and the steam drilling machine attracts considerable attention. The brick floors have all been laid in the new central station on State street, and interior construction is being rapidly pushed.

There will be a civil service examination in this city, Dec. 8, for the position of paleontologic draftsman in the geological survey corps at \$340 to \$500 per annum; also, Dec. 15, for the position of assistant steam engineer at the United States penitentiary, Fort Leavenworth, with salary at \$500.

WANT TO WORK FOR THE CITY.

Councilmen-Elect and Other Officers Besieged With Applications for Positions.

MANY OF THEM HAVE GOOD JOBS

But They Are Not Satisfied and Feel That Service for the City Would be A Most Pleasant Diversion.

That there are hordes of hungry men in this city—men hungry for political preferment—is evident from the fact that within the past 10 days, or ever since the late city election, applications for places have been pouring in thick and fast. Nor are these requests from men altogether in need, for among them are those who have lucrative positions but who feel that a few years' service for the city would not be amiss by way of diversion. Councilmen-elect are authority for the statement that many such individuals have already made it known that they are candidates for one place or another, and that they would like support when their names are handed in for confirmation. To such the advice has been given to remain where they are, only to bring back the retort that the positions they now occupy can be secured anew when conditions change and a new administration forces them to relinquish their places. How many of these hungry yet to be seen, but it is a safe guess that not one-third of them will be supplied with the positions they are now after.

RUMORS OF A CONTEST.

Some Say One Will be Feted by Mr. Dean.

Ever since George E. Burdige was declared elected to the city council there have been rumors in the air of a proposed contest, but up to date nothing tangible has materialized. For the purpose of ascertaining just how the thing stood, the "News" today communicated with several members of the Republican city committee, but none of them knew anything about it; if there was to be a contest, they said, they had heard nothing of it.

As will be remembered, Mr. Burdige was declared elected from the Second precinct, by a majority of 11 votes over Mr. George D. Dean, his Republican opponent. At the time of the canvass by the city council the friends of Mr. Dean contended that 10 votes counted for Burdige in the Fifteenth district were wrongly applied and they sought to have the ballots thrown out. Not successful in this the intention was made that the seat in the council would be contested and ever since there has been much anxiety in consequence. It is understood that personally, Mr. Dean is not favorable to a contest and that if one is filed it must be at the earnest solicitation of the city committee. On the other hand the friends of Mr. Burdige say that it would be foolishness in the extreme for Mr. Dean to engage in a contest for even if he gained the 10 votes in controversy, Burdige would still be one ahead and an official canvass would in all likelihood give him a much greater majority than he already has. And thus the matter stands.

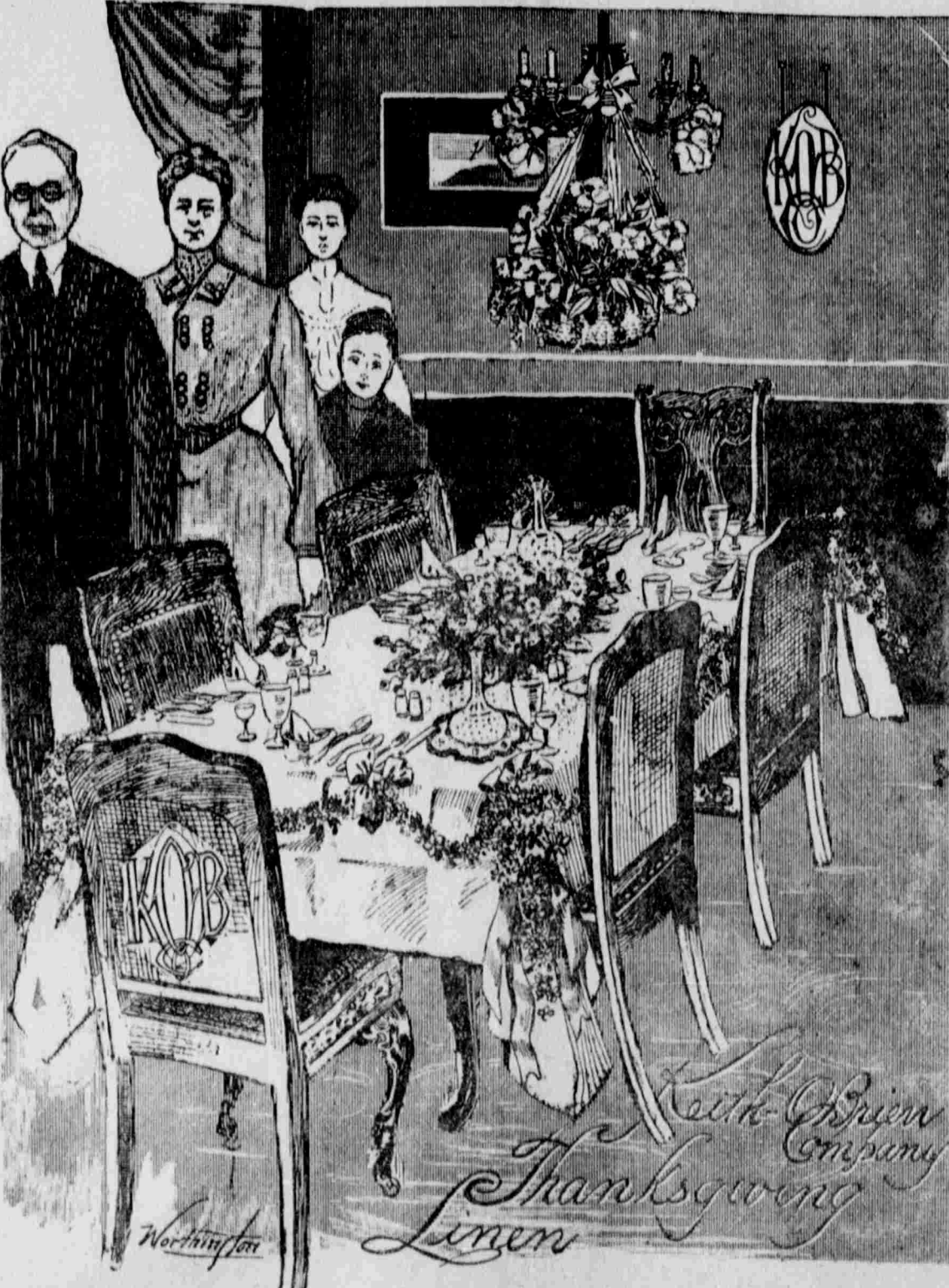
