A Starred Steamer.

The steamer England arrived

drink, and he nodded, shuddering

and died. The body was sent to the

morgue. The England left

BOX ELDER STAKE CON-

FERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of Box

Elder Stake of Zion was held in the

public hall, Brigham City, Octo-

ber 28, 1879.

Present on the stand Apostle

Lorenzo Snow, of the Presidency of

the Stake of G. Snow, besides

many of the Elders and leading

Elders of the Stake.

After singing and prayer, Elder

T. W. Brewster read the labor of

gathering the people together,

building up of Zion, and preparing

for events of the future, is a work

of great magnitude, this labor re-
