

“Then You Can Pitch In.”

The *Leader* noted a few days since that the female in question, whose liberal allowance of alimony * * * * *

led to the removal of Judge McKean from the supreme bench of the United States court in Utah, had been engaged to deliver a lecture at Sloan-station, on the Cleveland and Pittsburgh railway. This paper, in an editorial on that subject, referred frankly to the lady's life and reputation—a course which appears to have rather startled some of the Sloan-station people from the serenity with which they have been contemplating the coming intellectual feast on the social status of Brigham Young. * * *

She had been engaged to lecture for the Sunday-school, and the Sunday-school at Sloan-station does not want to be mixed up in any scandal even so near home as Iowa or Missouri, though it would not object to a benefit on the condition that the “twin relic of barbarism,” not to call it wickedness, prevails in the self-styled “State of Deseret,” otherwise known as the Territory of Utah. The consequence of its rude awakening was the following little communication, which was read with much interest in this office, as it doubtless will be at Sloan-station and vicinity, as well as in our favorite suburb of Steubenville:

“SLOAN STATION, O.,
“March 19, 1875.

“Editor *Leader*: Dear Sir—The committee have engaged _____ to lecture for us on the 19th and 20th of April, at this place and Steubenville. We have engaged her at a very large price; proceeds, if any, to go to the Sabbath-school. Your leader of March 17 is calculated to do us harm, as your paper has a pretty large circulation here and vicinity. We are not Mrs. _____'s advocate or defender; do not wish to lose money, would like it better if the balance was in our favor. Would it be asking too much of you as a journalist to hold up until our lectures are over? Then you can pitch in as hard as you like. If you can do this much for us, you can consider us your friends for the future and we will help the sale of your paper all we can, and in addition to this you can send us twenty copies of the *Leader* commencing April 1 up to April 20 for gratuitous distribution. If you conclude to do this, address package by mail daily to _____, with bill for full amount. We assure you that we will use papers discreetly and to your advantage. Hoping to hear from you soon, and that you will pardon our asking this favor, we remain yours, respectfully. Address.”

The *Leader* does not desire to injure the financial prospects of the Sloan-station Sunday school, nor would it willingly give any resident of that place or friend of the cause unnecessary distress; but its motto is an old one—“Let justice be done though the heavens fall”—and while it has no such vain ambition as to attempt to raze the celestial archway to a level with Sloan station on the C. & P. road, yet it does believe, and must insist, that _____ is not one who should go about flinging stones at women of less than her intelligence who may have been blindly entrapped into that which she seeks, or has sought, with undimmed vision, and with the vision of its _____ consequences before the open eyes of herself, a woman of mature years and somewhat of worldly experience. Nor does this paper believe that the Sunday school cause of America can gain any profit by the encouragement of such women and entertainments as those in question, though it may be that the gate-money be equally divided between herself and the schools. What doth it profit the Sunday school cause that it should put money in its missionary box while at the same time it indorses and sustains a shameless personage? Would not the “balance” be still found against that Sunday school which would risk its power for doing good by placing its reputation in the keeping of unclean hands? What money balance would be sufficient to weigh in the scale with such a condition of affairs.

But what temptation is this held out to lead the *Leader* into silently consenting to this sin, which even the writer of that Sloan-station letter cannot excuse except on a money basis? No journal should be intrusted with the power supposed to be represented by the *Leader* as a censor of all public events if it

may be induced by soft words to “hold off” comments on _____ till after the damage has been done, and then “pitch in” and blame where it had been a silent participant to the wrong perpetrated.

Then there is the bribe held out in addition to the soft words and pleadings—that twenty copies of the *Leader* should be paid for and gratuitously circulated at Sloan-station daily for twenty days—say four hundred papers, which might be considered of consequence in such a community as that. It is not much of a bribe offered, but it is enough, and quite as effectual as a greater one would be to buy over the *Leader* to advocate or silently consent to what it believed to be a wrong. This paper does not seek to extend its circulation even in Sunday-school circles by withholding its censure from what it believes to be a wrong.

Let the *Leader*, and _____, and the Sunday-school, and the salvation of Sloan-station stand upon their own merits and upon the truth, let the consequences be what they may. If they, or either one of them, cannot stand upon the truth, let them all go down together or singly as they may, but the *Leader* will speak its opinion, and when it thinks the Sunday-school wrong, which it does now, or when it thinks _____ unworthy to stand among the young and the good, or the aged and the good, it will say so, whatever befall the Sunday-school or the lecture or the circulation, and neither soft words nor appeals for the benefit of the balance, nor extra copies shall cause it to remain silent and witness the wrong with privilege to “pitch in” after the evil has been perpetrated. There is no practical use of “pitching in” after the deed has been done.

But after all, what damage has been done? This item will possibly prove a much better advertisement for _____, and fill the house better than silence would have done, but that is no affair of ours. People will go to hear her, and doubtless the Sunday-school will gain great financial reward.—*Pittsburgh, Pa., Leader, March 22.*

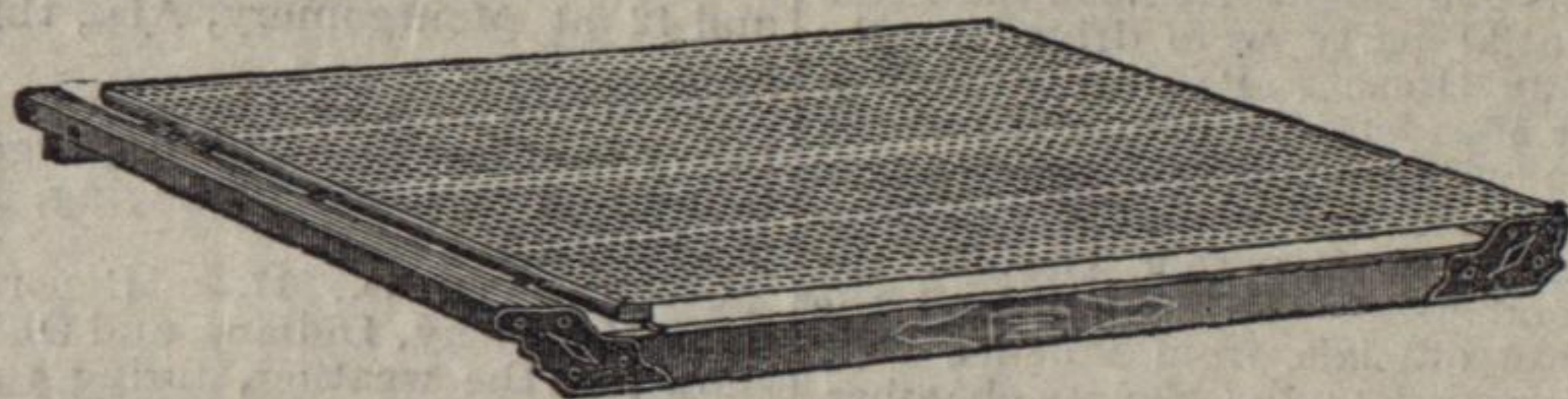
