Organization of the Church in Norway Observed in This City.

The fiftleth anniversary of the organization of the branch of the Church at Drammen, Norway, was observed in this city by Scandinavians, who met for that purpose in the Fourteenth ward assembly rooms, Thursday, Sept.

About 150 guests took part in the banquet, during which impromptu speeches were made by several of the Elders, who had been connected with organization, at various times, up to he present. President A. H. Lund and the brethren presiding over the Scandinavian meetings in Salt Lake City, were present, and also some of our talented musicians and singers, who rendered a fine and varied program.

After the tables had been cleared and removed, the people were entertained by speeches by prominent Elders, among whom was C. C. A. Christensen, who gave a graphic outline of the historic the mission in Drammen was commenced 50 years ago, by Elder C. Dorius, the late Bishop of Ephraim South ward, in Sanpete county, assisted by Elder C. C. A. Christensen.
