

Weekly Crop and Weather Bulletin. Boise, Idaho, June 19.—The mean tem-perature of the State for the past week was 63 degrees, which is an excess of 3 degrees. The first part of the week was cool, attended by thunder showers on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th in the southern sections, and on the 15th and 16th in the northern sections. On Sunday, the 17th, the weather began to clear and the temperature for the remainder of the week was above normal The precipitation was less than the normal, and in the southeastern counties was insufficient to dispel the

Fruit.—During occurrences of thun-derstorms on the 13th, much fruit was blown from the trees by unusually high westerly winds; this is an advantage since the trees are overloaded as a rule, and require thining. The high winds extended over the entire southwestern fruit district. Practically no wind, though many shade and forest trees were uprooted. The strawberry product is waning in the southwestern sections, while in other parts of the sections, while in other parts of the State the product is coming into market in perfection. Cherries are abundant in market. The Snake River peach and apricot crop is being harvested.

Grain and Grass.—Frequent showers last week prevented rapid progress in the hay meadows, but the rain falled to damage the hay in the field.
