VICTORY FOR OPERATORS.

Strike of Telegraphers on Santa Fe

Lasts Two Hours-Get Everything. Chicago, Nov, 14 .- The Tribune says Five minutes before the strike of the elegraph operators west of Albu-Albuuerque on the Santa Fe railroad sys-em was called, J. M. Barr, third vice resident of the Santa Fe, informed M. 4. Dolphin, president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, that the pany would grant the men's demands, President Dolphin burried to the train dispatcher's room, which was next door in the Great Northern building, and started to send a message to Albuquerque calling the strike off, when the lock struck 12 and the keys became si.

President Dolphin worked the key himself. He "called" and "called," but no amount of "calling" resulted in re-establishing communication.

Every operator on the line from Albu-querque, N. M., to Los Angeles, Cal., a distance of \$55 miles, had evidently left his post of duty.

Dolphin hurried to the Western Union Telegraph building, and after an hour and a half Dolphin succeeded in reaching the representative of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers at Needles, Cal. To him he sent the following message: "Call the strike off. The railroad company has acceded to the demands of the Use your utmost influence to get men back to their places and to re-esablish traffic at all points."

President Dolphin sent back the secret sign of the order, and then the answer came, "O. K." That practically ended he strike.
