"Where were the returns kept after they had been opened?" was asked by

counsel.

Witness' replied, in the room where the members of the Commission were at work; they were sorted on a darge table in the north west corner of the apartment.

As to whether any precautions were taken in regard to keeping the room locked during this time, Commissioner Sherman replied-There are three doors there, and we were as carfeful as possible to keep them locked. The question of the security of the question of the security of the papers was talked over, and the Commission, through its chairman, kept the doors looken.

Counsel inquired whether it was a frequent precaution taken by Commissioner Norrell to try from the outside the two doors which were looked with a suap lock inside in order to make sure that they were quite safe.

Witness replied in the affirmative, moon Commissioner Sherman again When court re assembled in the arterwent upon the witness-stand. In further answer to Mr. Williams he said his impression was that most of the returns from Sanpete county were delivered to the Secretary. Witness did not know what he did with them, Witness but he presumed they were securely locked up. He also said that the table of figures shown him said that gave the number of names on the poll list for Manti as 466; his own memorandum gave the number as 467. He thought that was the only discrepancy.

Mr. Letcher followed Commissioner Sherman on the witness-stand, and in reply to questions put by Attorney P. L. Williams, he stated that the returns from Baupate were received from Secretary Richards on November 20th. Some of them were in bad condition, the envelopes being torn. All the members of the Commission present when they were received; George E. Biair and Mr. Parks were the regular clerks of the Commission, but Joseph M. Cohen, was employed for some time, his duty being to make out abstracts for the Commission and the canvassing board. The Sanpete returns arrived on the 20th of November, and for two days were kept in the main work room of the Commission. On the 23rd they were placed in the safe of the secretary by Mr. Richards, the secretary's clerk. On December 3rd or 4th they were again returned to the Commission room. Other returns were kept in a closet securely logked. The main room of the Commission was also securely lock dat night.
