ARCHAEOLOGISTS HAVE ORGANIZED

The Society Will Affiliate With
Institute of America.

PROF. CARROLL'S ADDRESS.

More Names Being Secured and the
Organization Will be Officially
Recognized.

The Archaeological society of Utah was organized last night at the residence of Dr. Boer, 181 B street, and will affiliate with the Archaeological Institute of America. Forty-five citizens joined, and five more names are being secured today, when Prof. Carroll will officially recognize the organization. President M. Thomas called the meeting to order, and there was much enthusiasm manifested in the proposed line of work.

Prof. Carroll made an address, relating the prosperous condition of the societies on the Pacific coast, and the work they were doing. He said the Los Angeles society was one of the most progressive societies of the country, and is making a grand collection of ancient Mexican, Indian and Spanish relics. However, the professor thought the Utah field far exceeded the California in matters of archaeological interest; and the importance of the work here could be made second only to the Egyptian and Babylonian. W. H. Havenor spoke on archaeological finds in Death Valley, Cal., and showed archaeological remains which could be picked up in that region.

WOMAN TOOK CHLOROFORM.

Had Quarrel With Husband and Attempted to Kill Himself.

But for prompt work upon the part of Dr. J. U. Giesy, the Brunswick roominghouse on East Temple street would have been the scene of another suicide. One woman ended her life there on Tuesday, and was laid away yesterday. The victim of the last attempt at self-murder was Effie Stallman, who resides on Commercial street, and whose husband is a hack driver. She went to the roominghouse mentioned, and there took an ounce of chloroform, which she purchased from a druggist. At the same time the woman bought a razor, with the purpose of intention to use it on her same to end her life, should the drug prove ineffective.

It is said that Mrs. Stallman became jealous because of her husband's attentions to two other women. A reconciliation was effected, and later husband and wife went to a restaurant for supper. There the quarrel was renewed, and Stallman went away from the woman. The latter then made her purchase at the drug store, but her intentions became known and she was placed under arrest. At police headquarters Mrs. Stallman declared that she had no intention of killing herself, and she was permitted to leave the station, but she swallowed half of a two-ounce bottle of chloroform, and it was only after an hour's diligent work by the doctor that the woman was declared to be out of danger.
