LOCAL BRIEFS.

Col. Shangnessy Very Ill—Col. Shangnessy continues very ill with pneumonia at the Holy Cross hospital.

Fires on Power Water—L. B. Spencer filed with the state engineer Thursday afternoon application for 25 cubic feet of water from the tributaries of Ogden river for power in Salt Lake and Weber counties. The power desired is 1,200 horse power.

Air Transportation—Dr. Adolf Brodbeck will lecture on Air Mail Transportation this evening at the Y. M. C. A. under the auspices of the students' council of the association. The doctor has invented an air car which he is to describe.

Fires on Irrigation Water—Ephraim McMillan, of Heber City, has filed with the state engineer application for 37 second best of water to be taken either from Lake Fork lake or Moonlight lake. The desired water is to be used for irrigation and culinary purposes.

Celebrated with a Trunk—Thursday evening Patrolman J. J. Riley arrested E. Blair, R. Moore, and H. Real, three boys who are charged with stealing a trunk from the O. S. L. depot Tuesday night and burning the trunk and contents as a form of celebration over the election. The trunk and contents were valued at about \$30.

Falls Through Show Window—While dressing the window at Smith's drug store on Thursday afternoon, Dr. H. Vosmeyer, manager of the store, slipped and fell through the window. Mr. Vosmeyer says he cannot account for the accident but that he suddenly felt himself falling, and through the window he went. He received only a few scratches.

Free-For-All in Street—H. J. Miller was arrested Thursday afternoon on the charge of battery. His accuser is Fred Johnson who claims that Miller attacked him in Commercial street with a pair of brass knuckles and inflicted a severe cut over the eye. There was a free-for-all fight in the notorious street about 4 o'clock and Johnson declares Miller struck him without provocation.
