LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mr. Vosmeyer says he cannot recall the accident but that he suddenly felt himself falling, and through the window he went. He received only a few scratches.

Free-For-All in Street—H. J. Miller was arrested Thursday afternoon on the charge of battery. His accuser is Fred Johnson who claims that Miller attacked him in Commercial street with a pair of brass knuckles and inflicted a severe cut over the eye. There was a free-for-all fight in the notorious street about 4 o'clock, and Johnson declares Miller struck him without provocation.
