#### UTAH PRODUCTS FOR AUTOMOBILE TIRES

Another Utah industry, the manufac-ture of automobile tires with Utah products, has been started and the company will be known as the Hydro-Carbon Manufacturing company. Au-tomobile tires will be made by the use of glisonite, claterite and a part of veg-etable rubber. 
