Beware of Hair Washes.

About three months since, two days after an effectual application of the wash, a slight epileptic fit occurred, and six weeks afterwards a similar application was followed by palsy of the extensor muscles of the left hand. In this case probably another dose might have produced paralysis, but by this time suspicion was aroused, and by the steady application of antidotes the symptoms are now disappearing.
