There were 24 lives lost during the wreck, but we could not ascertain the names of any of the deceased persons. The Tartar had a full cargo in, and had just arrived from England .-The Elkin was about half discharged The Manuel, and John Patchell were also partially discharged. The F. Copeland & Co. belonged to San Francisco, and had taken in part of her cargo.

From the same source we learn that the clipper ship Waterwitch, Plummer, from this port, had arrived at Ipallo, an open roadstead near Mazatlan, to load wood for Europe; and that on little west of Temple Block. the 2d of June, she went ashore in the gale, and will be a total loss.
