Z. C. M. I. WILL CLOSE RETAIL BUSINESS.

Will Make in Ogden Large Wholesale Distributing Department.

JURY FOR THE CRAIG TRIAL.

Councilman Before the Court for Misappropriation of City Funds—Other Court Business.

Ogden, Feb. 24.—General Superintendent T. G. Webber of the Z. C. M. I. with headquarters at Salt Lake City, came to Ogden on the noon train yesterday, and spent about three hours in consultation with Manager John Watson, on the matters pertaining to the proposed change of the Ogden branch from a retail store to a wholesale department. The change is certain and will be made just as soon as possible. Manager Watson was seen after the consultation and stated that he had but little to give out at present on the situation further than the fact that the change has been under consideration for a long time past, as the Z. C. M. I. is very anxious to have a distributing point at Ogden for a great part of its immense wholesale business, and in order to accomplish that the retail business would have to be sacrificed, which will be done. Already the management has received a number of propositions for several of the departments of the store. It is understood that some of the employees of the Ogden store have made an offer to Mr. Webber to buy the clothing and hardware branches, taking the entire stock in these two departments. Their offer will be presented to the board of directors of the corporation who will likely accept the same. However, Manager Watson was not desirous of giving out the names of those contemplating the purchase. These two departments of the store, it is understood, have paid better than some of the other.

The stock of dry goods, crockery, and groceries it is understood will be closed out at once to the public at reduced prices, and the sale may be commenced as early as Monday morning, but it is believed it will take at least three months to sell the entire stock.

In the Z. C. M. I. retiring from the retail field in Ogden will mean that many thousands of dollars, reaching, it is understood, over \$200,000 annually, will be distributed among the other retail merchants which has heretofore been deposited with the Z. C. M. I. The building now occupied by the Z. C. M. I. is one of the best in the city, but needs many modern improvements, such as large show windows, and interior renovation, but it is not thought the institution will make these improvements as it is desirous of selling the building and site just as it is. The site is one of the very best in Ogden, and will bring a good price when sold.

When all the plans have been determined upon by the company, a warehouse site on Wall avenue, near the railroad tracks will be purchased, and a large warehouse built, but what lines of goods will be carried at the Ogden wholesale department has not been given out. Ogden is recognized as the best point in Utah for large wholesale businesses, having an advantage over most other cities in railroad facilities, as there are railroads going north, south, east and west from Ogden, thus enabling the wholesalers to ship their goods out to their customers with little delay. While Salt Lake is the best distributing point for the southern part of the state, Ogden has a great advantage for all other parts of Utah and the surrounding states, and the Z. C. M. I. has realized this to a greater extent during the past few years than ever before, since competition is becoming so keen, it therefore proposes to make Ogden one of its largest distributing points.

The Ogden branch of the Z. C. M. I. employs about 35 persons in all the departments of the store, and the closing out of the retail branch will leave a number of them without employment, but as most of the clerks are competent it is believed they will soon be able to secure positions in other stores.

JURY SECURED.

To Hear Case Against Councilman Craig for Misappropriation of Funds.

Ogden, Feb. 24.—All day yesterday was required to secure eight jurymen satisfactory to both sides in the case of J. D. Sloan against City Councilman William Craig, charged with misappropriation of city funds. The attorneys for the prosecution and defendant were very careful in securing the talesmen, and men who had no prejudice in the case for or against either side. A venire of 29 jurymen was exhausted before the eight jurors were accepted. The jury sworn to hear the case last evening.

DIVORCE SUITS GRANTED.

Judge Howell, besides sitting on the Craig case yesterday, heard three divorce suits.

The divorce suit brought by Margaret West against Charles C. West was called for trial. The testimony showed that the couple had been married since May 19, 1882, and have six minor children; that for more than two years the defendant has failed to provide for his family, also that in May, 1895, he was adjudged insane and committed to the state mental hospital, where he is still. Plaintiff was given a decree and custody of the children.

T. W. Thornhill was granted a decree of divorce from Rosa Thornhill on the grounds of desertion. They were married in 1894, at Blackfoot, Idaho. The bonds of matrimony existing between Mary A. John and Daniel J. John were ordered dissolved by the court. The evidence showed that the defendant had deserted his family and failed to provide for them. The couple were married at Ogden Oct. 19, 1893. The hearing of the divorce suit brought by Eliza Ann Pesco against

GET ACQUAINTED EXCURSION.

Southern Trip of Merchants and Manufacturers March 7.

Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 24.—Mayor Frisby has received a letter from Manager Place of the Manufacturers and Merchants' association relating to the proposed excursion to Nephi on March 7. Mr. Place says: "The Manufacturers and Merchants' association of Utah has completed its arrangements for the 'get acquainted' excursion to the south, which will be given Wednesday March 7. The train will leave Salt Lake at 8:30 a. m. Stops will be made at Murray, Sandy, Draper, Lehi, American Fork and Pleasant Grove. We will arrive in Provo at 12:06, remaining there fifteen minutes, when the journey to Nephi will be resumed."

It is expected the party will arrive at Nephi at 1:45 and will remain there till 3:15. On the return trip stops will be made at Santaquin, Payson and about 5:30. Here the visitors will rest about four hours and be entertained by the Commercial club and Provo citizens.

Mr. Place expresses a desire that a large number of Provo citizens will accompany the excursion south. Two bands will be on the train, and the trip through the south central part of the state will without doubt be a very pleasant and profitable one.

FARMERS ENCOURAGED.

Judge Erickson of the Seventh district, who has been holding court in Emery and Carbon counties, passed through Provo yesterday on his way to Mount Pleasant. He states that the farmers of Carbon and Emery counties are feeling greatly encouraged and hopeful on account of the heavy fall of snow and rain from the mountains this season. This will not be necessary this year, and there is every indication of a plentiful supply of water for irrigation when the crops come up.

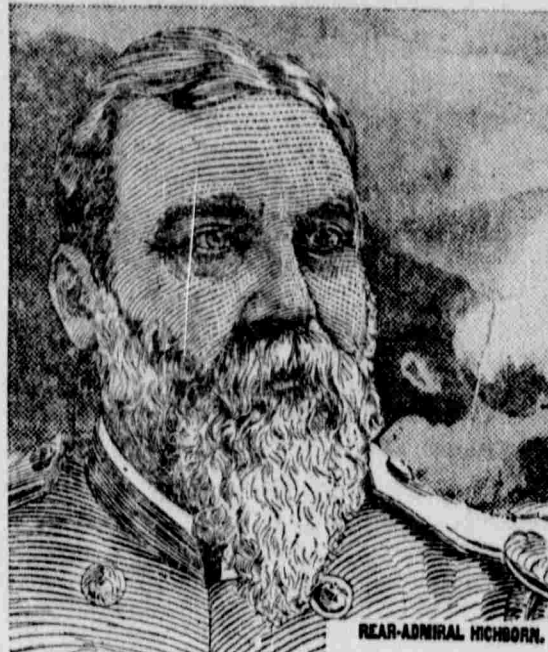
