## PLUCKY MAN STOPS SPEEDING RUNAWAYS

J. W. Ernst Throws Two Horses on Main Street—Mrs. Rose Lambert Badly Hurt.

A woman, Mrs. Rose Lambert, struck and buried in the street by the frightened horses with such force as to break an arm, and a heroic and spectacular stop of the plunging team by J. W. Ernst were the incidents in an exciting runaway yesterday afternoon shortly before 6 o'clock on Main street. That the runaway did not result more disastrously or cause greater damage was due to the pluck and courage of Mr. Ernst.

The team, belonging to Marriott's market, began its frightened dash on east South Temple street, running towards Main. As it turned and swung around the monument, Mrs. Lambert, wife of George C. Lambert of the Lambert Paper company, was crossing the street, and before she had half of the path to the horses she was struck. The force of the fall rendered her practically unconscious, and when she was carried into the Willies-Morris drug store it was found that she had sustained a fractured arm and a number of severe bruises.

Just as the horses dashed around the corner and struck Mrs. Lambert, Mr. Ernst, an attorney in the office of the Deseret News building, and grasping the danger of the runaway, made a lunge across the pavement and succeeded in seizing one of the trailing lines. As he wound it about his wrist and attempted to brace back, he was jerked forward and almost dragged along, but courageously clung to the line. After driving the horses a distance and just as the runaway horses were headed for several buggies and wagons standing at the street curb, Ernst with his weight on the line, managed to swerve the horses in a manner that threw first one and then the mate to the street. Several of the crowd that had stopped to watch the accident were struck by the horses in holding the horses.

Mr. Lambert was removed to the L. D. S. hospital after the accident. It was reported this morning that her condition was good and satisfactory.
