#### "FOR LICK BIG JIM 1 SURELY WILL;" SAYS CORBETT OF HIS FIGHT WITH JEFFERIES.

#### Special Correspondence,

San Francisco, July 22-Jim Corbett was being rubbed down this morning in his training quarters at Croil's gardens when he was told the story of McGovern claiming the featherweight championship after having been defeated by Young Corbett on the ground that Corbett was above the featherweight limit. When Young Corbett heard of McGovern's claim he replied, "Yes, that is true; but as I walk down the street every one will say, there goes the man who licked McGovent.

"Do you know?" said the ex-champion, "that was something like my experience 10 years ago. After I defeated John L. Sullivan when I arrived in any town the newspapers would hardly ever refer to me as the champion of the world, but invariably as the 'man who defeated the great John L.' I didn't mind it the least and will expect them to refer to me after the 14th of next month as the 'man who defeated big Jim Jeffries! For defeat him I certainly will."

Corbett went through a course of work today that is unusual for a heavyweight pugilist. Most of them devote their entire time to gathering speed and wind. Corbett's main idea is muscle building. As he says himself, he has 10 times the natural speed of Jeffries and if he sacrifices seven-tenths of it for the sake of punching power he will still be three times faster than the huge boller-maker.

For the first time in his career there is installed in his gymnasium what is known as the "heavy bag." Its weight is close to 600 pounds and at it Corbett hurls himself for a period of six rounds with the usual minute rests between. With big Yank Kenny eight rounds of the hardest kind of work is indulged in. It combines wrestling, tugging, shoving, and pulling about. At the conclusion of the eight rounds Kenny is exhausted. The latter is heavier than Jeffries and is no slouch of a fighter, having knocked out Gus Ruhlin and others. What speedy work Corbett follows is boxing with Sam Borger, considered the cleverest man among the big fellows aside from the ex-champion. Corbett's bout with Berger is the most interesting feature of the day. He is in, out, and at his clever but less experienced opponent faster than the eye can follow his movements.

Corbett now weighs 187 pounds and expects to enter the ring close to 192. This will be 12 pounds heavier than when he fought John L. Sullivan and Charlie Mitchell.
