Appropriated by Heber C. Jex for Light and Power Plant.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 19.-Notice of appropriation of all the waters of Spanish Fork river for the generation of electric current for light and pow-er, by Heber C. Jex, has been filed with the county recorder. The power plant will be located about one-half mile below the head of the Salem ditch, and the water will be diverted about three miles above the mouth of Spanish Fork canyon, and conveyed to the power plant by means of a flume six feet wide and four feet deep, and a pipe six feet in dlameter.
