HONORS MEMORY OF DEAD. Hon. Parley L. Williams, president of the association, presided over the function of the afternoon and deliv-ered an address. He spoke feelingly of the members who had been called by death during the year past, namely, James A. Miner. William W. Gee, A. B. Sawyer, S. W. Darke, Philip S. May-cock and Christopher Reed, and strong-ly advocated the adoption of a code of ethics to govern the conduct of members of the profession. Morals of members of the bar, he said, should be in keeping with their mentality. The selection of judges in an unpart-isan manner was another suggestion offered by Mr. Williams, and the work of the commission having in hand the revision of Utah statutes was com-mended. At last night's meeting of the Salt Lake County Medical society, the need of a special hospital for cases of conof a special hospital for cases of con-tagious diseases was discussed. Drs. A. S. Bower, R. W. Fisher and J. N. Harrison were appointed a committee to confer with the city and county of-ficials to see what could be done to-ward the establishment of such an in-stitution; particularly as quarantine in a hospital can be maintained with far more effectiveness than in a prifar more effectiveness than in a pri-vate house. It was stated that strang-ers taken sick with contagious diseases are refused at the hospitals, the hotels will not take them, and there is really no place for them to go.
