#### THE NEW ENGINES.

Interesting Chat With Captain Gramer Regarding San Pedro Locomotives.

Captain Cramer, the foreman in charge of the Baldwin Locomotive works party sent on with the new en-gines for the Salt Lake Route, says sines for the Salt Lake Route, says that he considers the new machines specially adapted to the service to be required of locomotives, and holds that they will be found all that could be desired. The new engines are being connected up at the Short Line round house and mustered into service at the rate of one every three days, though faster progress may be made later on. faster progress may be made later on. The engines are sent out over the line to limber up, and will be pressed into to limber up, and will be pressed into regular service as fast as may be de-sired. Two new switch engines, 16 and 17, have arrived and are stored on the siding near Fourth West street behind the passenger engines. The oll burners are being towed to California to be supplied with oil. The oll tanks are set right into what is the coal box in other engines, so that the tanks may be other engines, so that the tanks may be lifted out by a holst, and the space used for coal, if at any time the engine is to be changed over into a coal burn-er. Capt. Cramer says it will take er. Capt. Cramer says it will take only about two days to make such a change, at any time it may be neces-sary. The fire box construction is such that the transfer can be readily ef-fected. By a peculiar device in the cab, should the flues clog up with ac-

At a meeting in New York the direc-At a meeting in New Fork the direc-tors of the Panama railroad have de-cided to run trains over the line at night as well as day. Heretofore they have been run only in the daytime, be-cause there were so many so-called revolutions that it was considered unsafe to let a train proceed after it had become too dark to distinguish objects ahead. The directors also ordered some new equipment for both freight and passenger departments.

The Oregon Railroad & Navigation company has announced that on Feb company has announced that on Feb. 1 the rate on wheat from all interior points to Fort Worth, Galveston and Houston will be raised from 66 cents to 75 cents per hundred pounds. This change is made in view of the fact that the large part of the wheat crop is now out of the way and but fragmentary cargoes are being shipped.
