Conservative Estimates Place Number of Insurrectionists at 1,000 to 1,200.

QUESTION OF INTERVENTION. WONDERFUL CURE BY

Considerable Discussion as to Whether To Ask American Aid in Certain Eventualities.

CUBAN UPRISING

NOT FORMIDABLE

Havana, Aug. 20 .- Conservative estimates place the number of the insurectionists at from 1,000 to 1,200.

There is considerable discussion as to hether, in the event of Cuba being unable to suppress the insurrection, she should ask the United States for assistance or whether the United States may not intervene under the terms of the Platt amendment without such rejuest being preferred. In the meantime the government is entirely able to ope with the sliuation, although the ondition of unrest may continue for everal weeks.

President Palma has appointed Gen. Rafael Montaivo, secretary of public works, to be in charge of all military operations against the insurgents. President Palma has also decreed the increase of the rural guard to 4,000. The first death resulting from the nsurrection occurred this afternoon. While Gov. Nunez was automobiling to he westward on the Guanajay road he vertook a detachment of 20 rural pards who were following the trail of the insurrectionary leader Bandoras. Gov. Nunez joined the party and with n went some distance off the main road when suddenly one of the Bandoras hands was encountered. In a rapid exchange of shots which ensued Lieut. Gregario Rogue, the commandler of the ural guards, was killed. The band es-aped, dragging with them two of their en who are believed to have been ortally wounded.

Many mon who served as officers in the Cuban revolutions against Spain to-day visited or telegraphed to Presi-dent Palma tendering him their serv-ices for the suppresson of the insur-

A special train tonight took 100 rural guards from Santa Clara and 50 artilrymen from Havana to Pinar del Rio, ot even the railroad officials have been informed of the precise point of disem-barkation of these forces.

It is evident that the Pipar del Rio insurgents are concentrating in the vi-cinity of the city of Pinar del Rio, intent on occupying it for their headquarters.

Both the government and the Western telegraph wires were cut today be-tween Consolacion del Sur and Pinar del Rio for several hours. Finally a guarded train took workmen from Piar del Rio and repaired the lines. The "orkmen were not molested, but it is apected that the wires will be cut gain. However, it must be kept in mind that Chile enjoys very high finan-cial credit, especially in the London market, where her bonds are quoted at 98½ per cent. The external debt of Chile is about \$105,000,000, which has always been scrupulously served, and it takes only 12 per cent of the Chilean government revenue to serve this debt. The Chilean state railway alone represents nearly as much as the external debt, while the saltpetre lands represent four or five times as much more.'

Fort de France, Island of Martinique, Aug. 29.—Earthquake shocks of more or less severity were feit in the Island of Martinique at 1:15 p. m. yesterday and at 3:47 a. m., 4 a. m., and 5:37 n. m. to-day. No damage was done.

POR LADRONES.

Warning to All Looters Posted in Varparaiso.

New York, Aug. 12 -A cable to a morning paper from Calparaiso dated yesterday says:

The opportune arrival of the Chilean fleet, which steamed into the Valparaiso harbor to be here to welcome Secy. of State Root, helped to save the situation following the earthquakes. As in San Francisco, the sailors from the warships were landed and placed in charge of the city pending the arrival of the govern-ment troops. They patrolled the water front and guarded the wrecked banks and other buildings containing valuable, with front and guarded the wrecked hanks and other bulldings containing valuables, with orders to shoot thieves and marauders on sight. The solders shot a number of ladrones who were caught rifling the dead and robbing the bulldings and their bodies were suspended from telephone poles at the street corners, bearing large placards reading: "Por Ladrone," a warning to looters. A strange fact in connection with the earthquake is that the daily papers here published a prognostication of the catas-trophe several hours in advance of the first shocks.

Commercial Agent Fleming' states that the 12 government creameries in Alberta province last year turned out for the market 925,000 pounds of butter, which averaged 21.35 cents. The product was sold in British Columbia, Yukon, China, and Japan. The government op-erates and turns over the entire net profits of these creameries to the 1,200 farmers supplying the milk. Fifteen private creameries have also been established in Alberta, and these exported in 1905 650,000 pounds of butter. Thus the farmers of the province received one-third of a million dollars last year
