

## CUBAN UPRISING NOT FORMIDABLE

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### QUESTION OF INTERVENTION.

Considerable Discussion as to Whether  
To Ask American Aid in Cer-  
tain Eventualities.

Havana, Aug. 20.—Conservative estimates place the number of the insurrectionists at from 1,000 to 1,200. There is considerable discussion as to whether, in the event of Cuba being unable to suppress the insurrection, she should ask the United States for assistance or whether the United States may not intervene under the terms of the Platt amendment without such request being preferred. In the meantime the government is entirely able to cope with the situation, although the condition of unrest may continue for several weeks.

President Palma has appointed Gen. Rafael Montolio, secretary of public works, to be in charge of all military operations against the insurgents. President Palma has also decreed the increase of the rural guard to 4,000. The first death resulting from the insurrection occurred this afternoon. While Gov. Nunez was automobiling to the westward on the Guanajay road he overtook a detachment of 20 rural guards who were following the trail of the insurrectionary leader Bandoras. Gov. Nunez joined the party and with a few men he proceeded to the main road when suddenly one of the Bandoras' hands was encountered. In a rapid exchange of shots which ensued Lieut. Gregario Rogue, the commander of the rural guards, was killed. The band escaped, dragging with them two of their men who are believed to have been mortally wounded.

Many men who served as officers in the Cuban revolutions against Spain today visited or telegraphed to President Palma tendering him their services for the suppression of the insurrection.

A special train tonight took 100 rural guards from Santa Clara and 50 artillerymen from Havana to Pinar del Rio. Not even the railroad officials have been informed of the precise point of disembarkation of these forces.

It is evident that the Pinar del Rio insurgents are concentrating in the vicinity of the city of Pinar del Rio, intent on occupying it for their headquarters.

Both the government and the Western telegraph wires were cut today between Consolacion del Sur and Pinar del Rio for several hours. Finally a guarded train took workmen from Pinar del Rio and repaired the lines. The workmen were not molested, but it is expected that the wires will be cut again. Tonight the telephone wires in that region were cut.

Bandoras' band, which has been increased to 15, while proceeding near the railroad between Guanajay and San Antonio de los Baños, encountered eight rural guards, who immediately surrendered, were disarmed and let go. Other smaller bands have gone out in that vicinity and probably will concentrate with Bandoras' forces. The latter has attacked and rifled stores and stolen mules and horses at pleasure. The band stopped one railway train and shot at a number.

Many revolutionists are reported to have left Guanajay, including Col. Llaneras, who was captured with a negro companion and a coach loaded with arms, ammunition and 20 machetes. Several arrests were made today in Havana of persons suspected of aiding in the insurrection. Some small quantities of arms and ammunition have been seized.

The house and senate today, after a conference with Secy. of State O'Farrell, adopted a resolution declaring that the members would endeavor to secure, jointly and personally, the re-establishment of order.

The mayor of Consolacion del Sur has been suspended on suspicion of assisting the insurgents, and other officials are suspected.

A conspiracy has been discovered at Matanzas and the authorities are in possession of a list of names of men alleged to be connected with the plot, several of whom have been arrested.

### CHINESE STUDENTS.

Amherst, Mass., Aug. 21.—A conference of Chinese students of the eastern part of the United States began here last night with an address by Paul H. Linn of Columbia university. The program will run through the next four days.

The object of the conference is to bring into closer contact for purposes of study, discussion, recreation and the enjoyment of social advantages, students from China who are in eastern institutions of learning. Various Chinese educators of prominence will address the meetings and the Chinese minister, Sir Chen Tung Liang Cheng, will speak on Thursday.

### CITY OF VALPARAISO WILL SOON BE REBUILT.

New York, Aug. 21.—Judge Tonkin, a Chilean civil engineer, who is now in New York, said last night: "In Valparaiso local and foreign interests are so great that it is absolutely certain that the city will be rebuilt. The financial burden of rehabilitation will not be thrown on Chile alone, but also on the numerous foreign interests which include most of the nations of the world."

For the foreign interests, I believe the English will be the heaviest losers, especially the many English fire insurance companies that suffered such great losses in the destruction of San Francisco. However, it must be kept in mind that Chile enjoys very high financial credit, especially in the London market, where her bonds are quoted at 95 1/2 per cent. The external debt of Chile is about \$105,000,000, which has always been scrupulously served, and it takes only 12 per cent of the Chilean government revenue to serve this debt.

The Chilean state railway alone represents nearly as much as the external debt, while the saltpetre lands represent four or five times as much more."

### STANDARD OIL TRIALS.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—In preparing the indictments upon which the Standard Oil company is to be tried for accepting rebates, the government attorneys are making an especial effort to have the issue clear out and to that end a conference has been called for Wednesday, Dist. Atty. J. J. Sullivan of Cleveland has been summoned and in company with Asst. Atty. Sener Pagin, Special Prosecutor Morrison and his assistants, will examine each indictment carefully and endeavor to so draw it as to prevent it being quashed on a technicality.

In order to give the attorneys all the time needed both juries adjourned yesterday until Thursday morning, when it is believed they will make their reports to Judge Beetha of the United States court.

### PAT CROWE ARRESTED.

New York, Aug. 21.—Pat Crowe of Omaha, who became well known at the time of the Cuban kidnapping case, and who recently came to this city, was arrested last night, charged with being a suspicious person, and taken to police headquarters. The police, however, were unable to find a record of a case for which they believed he was wanted and released him.

### NEGRO TROOPS ORDERED FROM FORT BROWN.

Washington, Aug. 20.—The negro troops at Fort Brown, Tex., who have been having such serious trouble there, have been ordered to Fort Ringgold, Tex., and company B, Twenty-sixth Infantry, a white company now at Fort Ringgold, has been ordered to Fort Brown.

### NO INDICTMENTS YET.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—The two grand juries which have been considering the Standard Oil cases in the federal court, convened this afternoon, and after a 10 minutes session adjourned until Thursday without returning any indictments.

### THE CHORUS GIRL.

Rockefeller Thinks of Establishing a Home for Them.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 20.—According to a report received here from the east yesterday, John D. Rockefeller has undertaken a project of establishing a home for chorus girls to the extent of \$100,000.

The project, it is said, was planned by Miss Marie Cahill, the actress, and through a clergyman who is acquainted with her.

### SANTA FE RAISES WAGES.

Tonika, Kas., Aug. 20.—Voluntarily the Atchison, Tonika & Santa Fe Railway company has given the 1,900 telegraph operators on their system an increase of wages averaging about \$1 per month. This means over \$13,000 in increased expenses every 30 days from Chicago to El Paso for the Santa Fe. The order went into effect this week.

### EARTHQUAKE AT MARTINIQUE.

Fort de France, Island of Martinique, Aug. 20.—Earthquake shocks of more or less severity were felt in the island of Martinique at 1:15 p. m. yesterday and at 3:45 a. m. and 4:45 a. m. today. No damage was done.

### POR LADRONES.

Warning to All Looters Posted in Valparaiso.

New York, Aug. 21.—A cable to a morning paper from Valparaiso dated yesterday says:

The opportune arrival of the Chilean fleet, which steamed into the Valparaiso harbor, is held to be the cause of the State Root, helped to save the situation following the earthquakes. As in San Francisco, the sailors from the warships were landed and placed in charge of the city pending the arrival of the government troops. They patrolled the water front and guarded the warehouses and other buildings containing valuables, with orders to shoot thieves and marauders on sight. The soldiers shot a number of burglars who were caught rifling the dead and robbing the buildings and their bodies were suspended from telephone poles at the street corners, bearing large placards reading:

"Por Ladrones," a warning to looters.

A strange fact in connection with the earthquake is that the daily papers here published a prognostication of the catastrophe several hours in advance of the first shocks.

### DOWIE AND VOLIVA.

Their Peace Negotiations Have Been Abruptly Broken Off.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—John Alexander Dowie said last night that all negotiations between himself and William Glen Voliva for settlement of the Zion City tangle have been declared off. Dowie issued a statement last night in which he says:

"All attempts at negotiations have ended in failure. I made a clean cut proposition but Voliva and his adherents refused to consider it. Then I offered to consider a proposition from them, but it was twice stated that they had none to offer. Hence negotiations are closed and there is nothing more at this time to say."

### 50,000 VISITORS IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Fifty thousand visitors were said to have been according to estimates made by hotel proprietors and the Chicago Commercial association. They came from all parts of the country, merchants from far south as the Gulf of Mexico, and as far west as the Rockies, and a host of others who were visiting business and pleasure.

After dark it was impossible to get a room in any of the leading downtown hotels. The reason for such an enormous arrival of out-of-town people at this season," said Executive Director Barlow of the Chicago Commercial association, "is found in the results of the work of our association. We have been stirring the country for months for Chicago interests. The railroads are giving exceedingly low excursion rates to us, and they are being taken advantage of."

### CANADIAN GOVERNMENT CREAMERIES.

Commercial Agent Fleming states that the 12 government creameries in Alberta province last year turned out for the market 925,000 pounds of butter, which averaged 23.5 cents. The product was sold in British Columbia, Yukon, China, and Japan. The government creameries and turns over the entire net profits of these creameries to the 1,200 farmers supplying the milk. Fifteen private creameries have also been established in Alberta, and these exported in 1905 650,000 pounds of butter. Thus the farmers of the province received one-third of a million dollars last year from this one source.

During the past year Canada exported 34,520,705 pounds of butter, valued at \$7,040,739; cheese, 215,375,387 pounds, valued at \$2,457,540. The total value of the cheese, butter, bacon, and hams exported from the Dominion in 1905, including October, amounted to \$42,107,338, against \$38,457,432 for the year 1904. These exports alone amounted to \$9,000,000 more than all the products of the forest (rough and manufactured), and \$11,000,000 more than all the grain and grain products exported from this country during that period. The exports of butter from the United States during 1905 were valued at \$2,576,628, while the value of the cheese exported was only \$350,344.

### FURNITURE CLEANING.

For cleaning the dull or dirty wood of furniture, Miss Parlow gives the following directions and recipe. The following preparation, which must be kept well corked, is put on with a piece of felt, which may be bought at a painters' supply shop. Or a piece of fine hair may be utilized. In either case it should be washed after using.

In using, one should beware of hard rubbing, as that may cut through a varnish. The idea is to have the movement regular and continued long enough to produce a good deal of heat.

Only a portion of a large surface should be attempted at a time. Pumice stone may be used on oiled surfaces, or on finishes that are not fine or that are very dirty. This cleaner and polisher is said to remove white marks from oiled varnishes or painted surfaces. It must be shaken well before using.

The following must be put into a quart bottle, in the order in which they are named:

1 gill of powdered rottenstone.  
1 gill of cold-drawn linseed oil.  
1 gill of turpentine.  
1 gill of naphtha.  
1 gill of strong solution of oxalic acid.  
1 gill of alcohol.  
1 gill of cold water, to which has been gradually added a tablespoonful of sulphuric acid.

## CZAR DOESN'T KNOW SITUATION

His Intentions Good But He is  
Surrounded by Adverse  
Influences.

### IS CONSTANTLY IN THE DARK.

This Fact is Responsible for the Hopelessness of the Outlook.

Moscow, Aug. 20.—In an interview today Alex. E. Guchoff, who is regarded as one of the strongest and most capable Conservative Liberals in Russia, and who many times has been mentioned as the natural premier in a Conservative cabinet outside of the bureaucratic circles, spoke in a despondent tone of the future. He said:

"There can be no doubt of the emperor's good intentions. The great misfortune is that he does not comprehend the situation. The influences which hedge him about are such that it is impossible for him to understand what is going on in the country. The fact that the emperor is constantly in the dark regarding the true state of affairs is responsible for the hopelessness of the outlook."

"I have personally the highest respect for Premier Stolypin and am satisfied that if he could have his way he might be able to extricate the country from the dangers which threaten it in all directions. I fear, however, that his capacity will avail little against the influence of the court and ministers who surround him. For this very reason it was impossible for me, Count Heydon or others, to enter the cabinet. While I still believe that if the control of the ministry were placed in the hands of Conservatives and Liberals enjoying some measure of public confidence it might be possible to effect a reconciliation between the government and the people, the chances are daily, almost hourly, diminishing, and before the emperor could be induced to yield such a step it probably would be too late, as the march of the revolution will compel M. Stolypin, despite himself, to go further and further on the path of reaction and repression."

"In the meantime, in my opinion, there is little chance of a thoroughgoing amalgamation of the Constitutional Democrats and Octoberists. While the ultimate object of both parties is practically identical, namely, the achievement of a constitutional monarchy, the Russian situation is so different that the Constitutional Democrats have gone too far with the revolutionists to draw back, and the course of the government is bound to drive them further and further away from the methods to which we are committed."
